#### CANALS NEARLY COMPLETED.

Forty Miles Completed in the Tumello Basin.

Construction work on the canal lines of the Columbia Southern Irrigation company operating in the Tumello basin has been carried to the limit during the past five months, and it is expected that the main line with its numerous laterals will be completed early in the fall.

Practically 40 miles of ditch have now been dug, inclusive of the main canal 17 miles long and five laterals ranging from three to ten miles in length. The main canal runs to a point just east of Cline Buttes and covers a vast scope of sagebrush territory to the south and east.—Crook County Journal

#### DIPHTHERIA.

Five Cases Developed at College Place Recently.

Five cases of diphtheria recently developed at College Place are now in charge of County Health Officer Stiles. Both Dr. Stiles and Dr. Gannon, city health officers, visited the cases yesterday morning and pronounced them genuine diphtheria, says the Walla Walla Union. Mrs. Mildred Lechtenwaller, a widow and her three children are ill with the disease, one of the children being seriously affected. The other case is that of the child of S. E. Dodge. All the cases developed about the same time. It is believed the disease was brought here from Spokane.

## A WARM STARTER
