THE MEADOW ORCHID

WHY THE RUSSIAN PEOPLE CALL IT "THE CUCKOO'S TEARS."

A Legend of the Land of the Czars That Deals With Magic, Love and Happiness and One Result of the Fatal Feminine Tongue.

One warm Sunday afternoon the village maidens assembled to bathe in the river. They took off their kerchiefs and their coronet headresses, seated themselves on the bank to cool off and began to gossip. One maiden alone sat silent.
