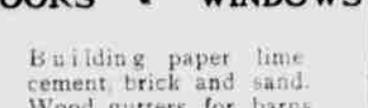

CROSSED PLAINS IN 1852. From Illinois to Oregon City by Ox Team—A Weston Pioneer.

W. H. Perkins, of Weston, Or., is in the city spending a few days with his brothers, T. J. Perkins, F. B. Perkins and E. L. Perkins, says the Spokane Spokesman-Review. On the way up he visited J. A. Perkins, of Colfax. Mr. Perkins is one of the pioneers of Oregon territory and came across the plains in 1852.

He was but 8 years old when his father and family started from their home in Marshall county, Illinois, and traveled for six months in an ox team to Oregon City, then the chief town in the Northwest. They came by Salt Lake City, the old emigrant trail by the mouth of the Boise river and over the Blue mountains to Meacham pass.

In those days flour was quoted at \$20 per hundred and pork at 40 cents a pound, and strong at that, after a six months' voyage around the Horn. Mr. Perkins has engaged in prospecting, freighting and wheat raising and is now retired from active business at the age of 60 years. He has been to Spokane twice, once in 1870 and in 1890, just after the fire.

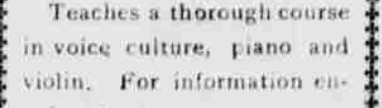
