JEWISH NEW YEAR

ONE OF MOST IMPORTANT HEBRAIC OBSERVANCES.
Supposed to be the Five Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-Fourth Anniversary of the Creation—History of the Occasion—is a Movable Feast, Influenced by the Moon's Phases.

New York, Sept. 22.—According to the Jewish calendar the 5,664th year since the creation of the world begins at sundown tonight. This being the Jewish New Year it is one of the most important festivities known to Hebrews, and elaborate preparations have been made for its observance all over the world. At sunset tonight the ceremonies begin, and they will continue for three weeks. The opening event is the feast of trumpets. Three days hence falls the fast of Guedallah, when the orthodox Jew abstains from food, and even from water. Other important days during the festival season are the feast of tabernacles on the 15th day, and the

rejoicing of the law on the 21st. All these ceremonies are required to properly begin the Jewish New Year. The first day of the year is regarded by the Jews as the day of judgment, because they say that on that day God sits in judgment on the deeds of individuals and assigns to every one his fate for the coming year—death or life, or the kind of death due those who die, such as death by fire or water. The prayer offered on the first day is that the names of all the people may be written in the book of life. New Year's day has for its distinguishing feature the blowing of the "shofar"—a straight horn of antelope or wild goat. This trumpet call is designed to serve as a summons to all Israel to enter upon the work of sanctification and prepare for the day of atonement.

The Jewish New Year is a movable feast, like the Christian festival of Easter, and is fixed by the changes of the moon. The longest year was 385 days and the shortest 355 days, but the complete cycle of 19 years corresponds with 19 solar years. The leap years, arranged to make the year synchronize with the seasons, contain 13 months. On this day, 5,664 years ago, the Jews say, God began the work of the creation.

On the lower East Side there is scarcely a hall to be found which is not occupied for religious purposes during the holidays. The theaters are all converted into synagogues, actors turn cantors, and some lodges are even forest to hold services in the rear of saloons. During the last few days Canal and Grand streets have become more and more impassable as the holidays approach. Clothings in particular have reaped a harvest.

CRANE LIFTS 60 TONS.

Mechanical Wonder Now in Operation at St. Louis.
The most massive machine ever seen at work in any exposition may now be viewed at the World's Fair grounds in St. Louis. In the Machinery Palace is a Niles crane, used for installing the heavy machinery. This crane can lift a weight of 60 tons and move it to any part of the great 1,200-foot structure with as much ease and precision as a man can place an article weighing 10 pounds. The crane runs the entire length of the building on two steel rails 75 feet apart, and spans the central nave of the great structure.
Electricity is the motive power. A man perched in a cage at a dizzy height sits in a chair and controls every move of the ponderous crane. Workmen attach the objects to the great hook suspended to mighty steel wire cables. A signal is given, a lever is turned with a sound as of a mighty insect confined, the crane lifts its burden and moves to the proper place and deposits its load without noise or confusion.

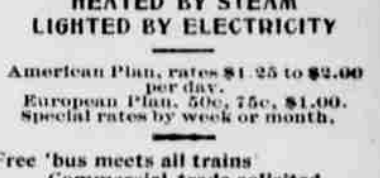
