A great many farmers carry their crops for a long time after harvest waiting for an advance in prices. Those who need money can get a large part of the value of their crop out in money and still hold the grain for an advance in the following manner:

Suppose a farmer has 5,000 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 60 cents a bushel; let him sell it and receive \$3,000 in payment; then let him buy 5,000 bushels of May wheat and margin it 5 cents a bushel. This will require \$250.00. He will then have \$2,750.00 to use as he sees fit. If the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel, he will make \$250.00 the same as if he had held his 5,000 bushels of wheat in his granary.

## FARMER CONGRESS

INCREASING ATTENDANCE EACH DAY AT NIAGARA FALLS

Important Topics for Papers and Addresses—Convention Will Close on Friday Morning—Informal Discussions on Wide Range of Subjects.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Sept. 23.—The National Farmers' Congress resumed its sessions this morning. There was an increase of attendance over the opening day, owing to the arrival of a number of delegates who had been delayed en route. Two sessions were held during the day and they were full of interest and instruction to those engaged in agriculture and the allied industries.

Some of the papers and addresses presented were as follows: "Infectious and Contagious Diseases of Farm Animals and Their Effects on American Agriculture," Dr. D. E. Salmon, United States department of agriculture; "Farm Products in the Markets of the World," Hon. O. P. Austin, statistician United States treasury department; "How Can We Enlarge Our Foreign Markets for Farm Products?" Hon. James Wood, Mt. Kisco, N. Y.; "Insect Pests of Plants and Their Effect on American Agriculture," Prof. S. M. Webster, Urbana, Ill.

Besides these set addresses and papers, which were listened to with close attention by the members of the congress, there were a number of informal talks and discussions covering a wide range of subjects relating to farm and farming. The sessions of the congress will be continued tomorrow and conclude Friday morning with the transaction of unfinished business and the election of officers for the ensuing year.

### GERMAN M. E. CONFERENCE.

Several Hundred Delegates in Session at St. Paul.

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 23.—Several eastern South Dakota and western Wisconsin are in St. Paul for the annual meeting of the German Methodists of the Northern conference. The conference is to be formally opened this evening with a sermon by Dr. C. Golder of Cincinnati. Other eminent divines to be heard during the week are Bishop Fitzgerald of St. Louis and President C. B. Adcox of the Central Wesleyan college at Warrenton, Mo. One of the important matters before the conference is the selection of delegates to the general conference, to be held next May at Los Angeles.

### PENNSYLVANIA BANKERS.

Being Addressed by Former Comptroller of the Currency.

Pittsburg, Sept. 23.—Three hundred of the leading bankers and financiers of the state filled the assembly room of the Hotel Schenley to-day. When the ninth annual convention of the Pennsylvania State Bankers' Association was called to order by President J. E. McAllister. Routine business occupied the greater part of the opening day and the real work of the convention, including addresses by men of wide reputation, will take place tomorrow. Foremost among the scheduled speakers is Charles G. Daves, of Illinois, former comptroller of the treasury, who will speak on the subject of the proposed changes in the federal banking laws.

### STATE CHARITIES MEETING.

Indiana State Conference in Session at Fort Wayne.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Sept. 23.—The Indiana State Conference of Charities and Corrections is holding its 12th annual meeting at the First Presbyterian church. The sessions will continue through Friday. More than 100 delegates from various parts of the state are in attendance, and a large number of Fort Wayne people are taking an interest in the proceedings. The subjects to receive special attention at the present conference include juvenile courts and probation work, outdoor relief, home-finding and child-saving, and county and city charities.

### Puget Sound Conference.

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 23.—The Methodist lay conference of the Puget Sound district opened in this city today with Bishop Hamilton, of San Francisco, presiding. About 350 delegates are in attendance, representing all of the churches of the district. One of the features of the conference will be the inauguration of Dr. E. M. Randall as president of the University of Puget Sound.
