THE CATTLE MARKET HAS SLUMPED CONSIDERABLY.

Growers Have Faith That the Bottom is Reached, or Nearly So—Hogs Have Advanced in Price—Flour is Cheaper and Sugar Dearer—Many Price Changes in the Produce Market.

The cattlemen are suffering under another drop in the price of their cattle in the markets here. Last week the price dropped a couple of points, and this week it has fallen still lower. What the end will be cannot be told, but the men of the county are of the opinion that it will not fall much lower. If it does, they will not be able to feed and pay for the hay that they put into the stock before they sell. Some of the men in the business and buyers at that, predict that by the first of the year the prices will have reached and surpassed the old standard of a few months ago.

On the other hand, the price of hogs has risen, and it takes money to get them now. This is due to the fact that all of the little pigs nearly were sold out of the county last year, and there was not enough stock to raise from in order to supply the demand this season. The price is but comfortable, however, and works no great benefit on the grower, or harm on the buyer.

How to Sell a Crop and Still Have it.

A great many farmers carry their crops for a long time after harvest waiting for an advance in prices. Those who need money can get a large part of the value of their crop out in money and still hold the grain for an advance in the following manner:  
Suppose a farmer has 5,000 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 65 cents a bushel; let him sell it and receive \$3,250 in payment; then let him buy 5,000 bushels of May wheat and margin it 5 cents a bushel. This will require \$325,000. He will then have \$3,000 to use as he sees fit. If the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel, he will make \$250 the same as if he had held his 5,000 bushels of wheat in his granary.
