

Some of the men are beginning to get frightened that prices are to touch bedrock in the near future and the sales reported yesterday afternoon and today were quite large. Independent buyers assert that all the big wheat exporting firms along the coast have formed a combine to the coast have formed a combine to the farmers to accept it. The decline of wheat from 82c to 74c—the quotation of yesterday—during the past week is said to be said to week is said to be due to the con-certed efforts of the combination.

While the price is fixed at 75c, very little wheat, it is explained, is selling at that figure. The mill operators are still paying from 78c to 81c, and are taking all they can handle. Their market is almost wholly in the Ori-ent, except for small shipments which they occasionally make to San

Francisco. The exporters are hopeful that the milling demand will soon fall off, and the farmers will be compelled to sell to them at the combination's price.

The farmers, apparently, are organized, or at least have a general un-derstanding among themselves, be-cause they refuse to sell to anyone but the millers, who are paying the price they ask.

In the meantime the mills are running to their full capacity to supply the Oriental demand, and the farm-ers are said to believe that this big market thus opened to them will con-tinue indefinitely.

Bad Corn Prospects.

The outlook for a fair crop of sugar corn in the Eastern and Central West states is not very encouraging at this time. Farmers in the corn states have lost money for the past two seasons on account of the shortage in the crop and the acreage of corn next crop and the acreage of corn hext year is very likely to be much reduc-ed under that of this season.
