

# INVADE KENTUCKY

SALVATION ARMY BRIGADE  
AMONG MOONSHINERS.

Cavalry Band of Missionaries Seeks to Spread Religion Among Feudists—Well Received When Known They Were Not Revenue Officers.

Jackson, Ky., Sept. 28.—The "Mountain Brigade," a detachment of General Booth's Salvation Army, invaded Jackson, as they had promised and left here on the 300-mile trip on horseback over the mountains. This trip will embrace a tour of the counties of Breathitt, Magoffin, Floyd, Pike and Letcher, and a sojourn of two days will be made at the county seats of each. Stops will be made and meetings held in the way stations between the several county seats.

It is the general opinion of Jacksonians that the visit of the Salvationists will benefit this community. They preached a religion of love and good will among men, and those who have taken no hand in the feuds are hopeful that their sermons will in some degree remove the bitterness between the followers of the feud leaders.

Eight meetings were held during the stay of the missionaries in Jackson, four of them being held on Main street, in front of Provost headquarters, which are located in the courthouse yard opposite Hargis Bros.' store. Judge Hargis was an interested spectator at these meetings, and generally occupied a chair on the sidewalk in front of his store during their progress.

### Salvationists Well Treated.

When the Salvation came last week it was cordially greeted by a people to whom its method of gospel warfare was new. Many Jacksonians contributed to its support, and some furnished food and shelter for some time. However, there were no on the other hand, some regarded the whole thing as a fake and a scheme to make money. To those of this opinion the custom of the Salvationists to take up collection at every meeting furnished an evidence to sustain this theory.

The personal appearance of the members of the army was largely in their favor, and many were heard to remark that they were a fine lot of the missionaries during their stay. Converts made by the Salvationists. A number of the people at the indoor meeting went forward to be prayed for, but no evidence was given to the public that any greater impression was made upon the seeker.

"Rat Ankles" Noble, who was the star witness for the defense in the Jett trial in Cynthia, and who swore that he was talking to Jett at the time that Marcus was shot, went forward at the first night's meeting and asked to be prayed for. He also stated that he was intoxicated at the time, but after that night he never intended to take another "drop." He never attended another of the Salvationists' meetings, but so far has kept the promise he made to them. Several church people of the community took part in the services at the courthouse.

### Moonshiners' Surprised.

Colonel Holtz, the Salvation army leader of Cleveland, and his band that are canvassing the Kentucky mountains investigating the feuds, came near meeting with unexpected trouble near here. Just out of this place they inquired if there was a church or schoolhouse where they might stop and do some evangelistic work while resting.

A woman told them that off to the left and down in the creek bottom they would find a crowd of men. The little cavalry band, leaving their wagon on the main road and taking with them some of their musical instruments, went down the side of the bluff until they saw the men working about a small log house.

They were surprised at two shots being fired and then to see men running in different directions. They came to a halt and wondered why the men had run. A guide soon explained the situation. It was a moonshine still and the shots were fired as a warning to the operators to make good their escape, which they had done.

The Salvation Army men were in high glee and hastened to explore the place. After being assured that the intruders were not revenue men the operators were persuaded to come back, set up the fire, and show the visitors how the liquor was made. After the investigation the Salvationists held religious services and some of the moonshiners joined in the singing.

Strange Man Creates a Sensation at Oregon City.

Bareheaded and barefooted, with an iron chain wound around his waist, and going south on the railroad track as fast as he could walk, a man giving his name as George B. Meacom, hailing from Beverly, Massachusetts, was arrested in Oregon City yesterday by Chief of Police Burns, and examined by County Physician Powell on a charge of being insane, says the Salem Statesman.

The man seemed all right except when he had a chance to talk on religious subjects, when he gave vent to some rather startling statements, announcing himself as the bridegroom of Jesus Christ and stating that his mission was to perform miracles. The examination developed the fact that he had twice escaped from insane asylums, presumably in the East. He said that if this was not believed by the examiners, they could write and ask them. The local officials decided to take his word for it. The strangest thing about the stranger is his diet of fir boughs, wrapped in paper leaves. He swallowed these without chewing, and stated that he had gained weight since he had adopted this diet. About four of these a day are required to keep him in good form, and just to show the examiners that he acted in good faith, he swallowed one of these strange objects, of which he had a good supply in his pockets.

Upon his person was found a statement of things he thinks he can do, among them being "to walk on water, raise the dead, and that he knows how to live forever." A short iron chain found with him was, he declared, his faith chain, and considerable harm would come to him if he lost it. He was brought to Salem last night.

### GENERAL NEWS.

A speed of 117 miles per hour has been attained over the Sossen experimental electric railway in Germany. J. B. McMillan, a Katy conductor, was killed Saturday at Caddo, I. T., by tramps whom he had put off his train.

An unsuccessful attempt was made Saturday to kidnap the 8-year-old daughter of Governor Mickey, of Nebraska.

The city of Dresden has opened a drunkards' home, where those hopelessly addicted to liquor can stay three years at a cost of 45 cents per day.

Judge W. G. Wylie, of the Louisiana supreme court, died of pneumonia Saturday last on an ocean steamer, en route from England to New York.

Common contagious diseases, the causes of which are practically unknown, are scarlet fever, measles, chickenpox, yellow fever and hydrophobia.

Patrolman Dennis Fitzgerald, of Chicago, was Sunday last knocked down with his own club and shot twice with his own pistol, in a fight with two negroes.

Portugal has established a naval embargo of the Azore Islands to stop emigration. All the inhabitants who can get away are leaving, most of them for the United States.

The body of Hans Hausen, the missing chief engineer of the German steamer Eva, was found Saturday, floating in San Francisco Bay. His disappearance is associated with that of Captain A. Drillet, of the French steamer Detalle. The latter has not been found.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

A local capitalist will construct a hotel in Portland to cost \$180,000.

There are now about 40,000,000 eggs in the Ontario salmon hatchery. Plans for a Crittenton training school for girls are now under way in Spokane.

Nine business houses were destroyed in Idaho Falls Saturday, loss about \$12,000. Edward Brown, a logger of Grant's Pass, was crushed to death in a jam of logs Saturday evening.

Noble Hamilton, one of the ablest jurists of the Pacific Coast, died at San Francisco Sunday, aged 87.

D. M. Letts, a Southern Pacific brakeman, had a foot cut off by a derailment at Ashland Saturday.

The Salvation Army of the Pacific Coast will observe Harvest Festival Season from October 3 to 6, this year.

The 11-year-old son of H. W. Scott, of Forest Grove, killed a huge black bear which had entered the cow lot, Saturday night.

A charge of manslaughter has been brought against the managers of the Florence Crittenton Home, at Portland, for causing the death of an infant.

Tickets for two large lottery companies are being sold continually in Portland, according to the advice of patrons of the concern. The police are investigating.

W. J. Howells, superintendent of the state hospital at Medical Lake, Washington, was fined \$5 Saturday, for striking an insane person. The inmate assaulted was armed with a club and had defied the superintendent.
