GENERAL NEWS.

Archbishop Kain, of St. Louis, who has been ill at St. Agnes sanitarium, Baltimore, for several months, can live but a short time.

W. S. Statfield, an employe of the American Express Company, at Rockaway, L. I., absconded with \$6,000, but was captured at Chicago.

In spite of \$5,000 reward offered, search for the murderers of Millionaire O. P. Dexter, at Santa Clara, N. Y., has been abandoned. The murder was in June last.

The pilgrim producers of the East, from Alabama to New York, have decided upon a 20 per cent reduction in the output for the coming year, claiming overproduction.

The value of the tropical products brought into the United States in 1902 was three times as much in 1870, twice as much as in 1875 and one-third more than in 1895.

Industrial dividends in New York, October 1, will equal \$15,593,296, an excess over September 1 of \$2,300,000, and over August 1, of \$1,000,000. Legitimate investments seem to be very little affected by the Wall street furries.

Because the Southern Pacific cut Ventura, Cal., off the map, that city and tributary territory boycotted the road in August, and September 29 the road gave up the fight and reopened its station. The diverted travel and freight is said to have cost the company \$10,000.

It has developed that for every Russian soldier withdrawn from Manchuria and contiguous Chinese territory, a railroad or other "laborer" is sent into the same territory. Almost invariably the "laborer" has a full complement of arms to protect himself while following peaceful pursuits.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The freight bills of the Jabour Carnival Company have been paid by the Portland carnival management, and the property released.

R. M. Merriman, a rancher of Centerville, Wash., was found dead in his cabin, between The Dalles and Goldendale, Tuesday, having committed suicide.

The Indians of Sitka have formed a game trust, and refuse to furnish game to the Seattle hotels until certain restrictions in the game laws are removed.

The 14-year-old daughter of "Buffalo" Jones, of Yellowstone Park, was assaulted by a tourist Tuesday in the park. Officers are now in search of the offender.

A big irrigation scheme is now on foot in the Coeur d'Alene country, by which the water of Hayden lake will be used for reclaiming a large tract of desert land.

The faculty of Whitman College has indorsed, and will pass a ruling forbidding hazing in that institution. The recent wholesale ducking of students has driven the faculty to this action.

The new official seal of the state of Oregon, as designed and ordered by the last legislature, is now in use. No new features are introduced, but the points in the old seal are more clearly shown.

The state Lewis and Clark commission of Oregon, has purchased the famous collection of Oregon woods, made by A. J. Johnson, of Astoria, for the St. Louis and Lewis and Clark fairs, for the extremely low price of \$700.

CANNERY FOR MILTON.

Capital May Become Interested in the Industry. Owing to the unprecedented growth of the fruit growing industry in the Milton and Freewater districts local capitalists are considering plans for starting a fruit and vegetable cannery at Milton. While the market for all kinds of fruit grown in this district is very active, yet the increasing acreage of orchards promises to yield enough early fruit to justify a cannery. In addition to supplying all demands outside. It is estimated that enough freight is paid on canned stuff in Milton, Athena, Weston and Freewater each year to build a small cannery, and as the demand for canned vegetables and fruits is constantly growing in the mining districts of Eastern Oregon, Idaho and Montana, it is thought a cannery here in the fruit district would pay well.

It would cost less in freight charges to reach the markets from here and would furnish a ready home market for fruits of all kinds, at all seasons, and much expense of costly packing would be saved. With a cannery conveniently located in the orchard district, a great amount of fruit that is now lost to the growers would be saved.
