DELINQUENT TAXES.
 Don't Forget That Monday, October 5, is the Limit.
 The farmers of the county who have not paid their taxes as yet are beginning to waken to the fact that the delinquent roll for the second payment will close on Monday next, and are coming to the sheriff's office with the amount of their taxes. At this time there is perhaps \$1,500 yet due, but this amount will be much less by the time the roll closes, in the last of this week. It is not thought that more than from \$5,000 to \$10,000 will be out by the time the penalty is added.
