GENERAL NEWS.

Six hundred smoking-pipe makers in New York, have returned to work after being locked out for starting a strike. All that they gain is recognition of the union.

The wind blew at a velocity of 100 miles per hour during the recent hurricane in the Bermudas. Great losses were sustained by the fruitraisers, and many buildings were destroyed.

President Walmsley, of the New England Cotton Manufacturers' Association, states that speculation pure and simple, does more than all other causes to depress and demoralize the cotton market.

Santa Cruz, Cal., has been pluming itself over the erection of a "burglar-proof" steel and cement jail. Three prisoners out of the first batch put therein, dug and piled their way out and cannot be found.

The New York Botanical Garden is now the fourth in size and importance in the world. Six thousand new species embracing 21,000 specimens, have lately been added from the West Indies, Honduras and Bolivia.

Brigands are committing a reign of terror on the Chinese side of the Yalu river, while on the Russian side is perfect quiet. Russia is suspected of something the trouble, as to the chances to invade herself across the river to straighten it out.

Mayor Harrison, of Chicago, speaking of the city hall says: "If I could are all the men I suspect of 'grafting' they would be jumping out of every window in the city hall. This hall is full of graft, I have 15 months left, and I will get some of them yet."

Two robbers, without masks, held up a saloon at Rawlins, Wyo., Wednesday, and secured \$3,700 from the cash drawer and the gambling tables.

Jeff Nye, who has been burned out in the saloon and hotel business twice, at Long Beach, Wash., will erect a concrete building and continue in the business.

The Indrapura, the O. R. & N. Oriental steamer, left Portland Wednesday with a cargo consisting of 52,576 barrels of flour and 244,908 feet of lumber for Hong Kong.

John F. Davidson, local agent for the Kerr-Gifford Grain Company at Endicott, Wash., has eloped with Mrs. Muntz, wife of a saddle-maker of that city. Both leave families in Endicott.

It is said that Jim Connors, the wounded train robber, now in the Portland hospital is a former member of the Curry and Cassidy gang of thugs and robbers which operated in Minnesota and Dakota, several years ago.

Mrs. Julia M. Parsons, wife of C. E. Parsons, an attendant at the state insane asylum, has asked for a divorce on the grounds that Parsons has persistently stolen articles from the institution, secreting them at their home, against her protestations.

FIVE PUMPKINS TO THE LOAD.

Original Stock Cost Two Cents Per Seed—First-Class for Stock.

T. D. Oliver was in the city this afternoon with a load of pumpkins. He drove a large two-horse hack and had five pumpkins to make his load all that the vehicle would hold. Each one of the pumpkins weighed between 70 and 100 pounds, and were all grown on a couple of rods of ground 1½ miles down the river on the Oliver ranch.

Several years ago Mr. Oliver sent to cents back East for a sample of mammoth pumpkin seed, and received five seeds in return for his money. He planted the seed and raised four pumpkins from the lot. Now, each year he raises a good-sized crop for his own use, and is beginning to supply the market.

The pumpkins are nearly as fine in flavor as the smaller ones for the use of the home, but they are better for feeding to stock than for the table use. It is the intention of Mr. Oliver to send a few of the biggest ones to the exhibit at the carnival, provided the roads are good so he can haul them to town.
