United States Government Will Furnish Complete Model of One of the Immense Fighting Ships and Will Have Moving Pictures Representing All Movements on Board,

This model will occupy the central portion of the naval exhibit and will be free of access to visitors, who thus will be enabled to examine caredifferent calibres. fully and at close range a modern American man-of-war. Next in importance to the warship

Next in importance to the warship model will be the exhibition hourly, while the government building is open, of biograph motion scenes, il-lustrative of the life and duties of the crews on United States men-of-

war.

These miving pictures will be thrown on a 20-foot canvas and were taken during the summer maneuvers of the North Atlantic squadron off the coast of New England. The scenes reproduced show the mateuvers of vessels, great gun exercises, landing parties, boat races, fire quarters and general muster.
