PENDLETON RETAIL MARKETS

Quotations on Staples Furnished by Local Merchants and Revised Daily.

Eggs are not high priced in Pendleton alone, but in Boise City they are selling for 30 and 35 cents per dozen, in Baker City 30, Walla Walla 27 1/2 and in La Grande they cannot be bought at any price. In Wallowa county they are yet comparatively cheap, selling at 22 and 23 cents in trade.

There are several thousand dozens of packed eggs in that county which will be unloaded next week. In Sumpter and Granite eggs are always very high priced at this season of the year, but just now they are 40 cents, being the high water mark for October for several years. Peaches are on the wane. Green beans are somewhat out of season, and dry onions are coming in.

MILKMAN A MURDERER.
Seattle Jury Finds That Poison in Milk Killed Infant.
A jury in Seattle has found that the Duwamish Dairy company is guilty of killing a Greek infant, by the chemicals used in milk furnished the family.

The child died from some unknown cause and the coroner had the funeral procession stopped, and the child's stomach examined. It was found by experts that death had been caused by formaldehyde, used in the milk as a preservative, and warrants were at once issued for the members of the dairy company.

The Seattle Star is credited with prosecuting the fight against impure milk and this is one of the results of the investigation.
Sole of Imported Thoroughbreds.
New York, Oct. 2.—Prominent horsemen from many parts of the country attended the opening of the great sale of imported thoroughbred stock at the American Horse Exchange today. The thoroughbreds to be disposed of at the sale form one of the largest collections of imported blood ever brought to this country. Among the lot are 22 brood mares from the studs of King Edward VII, the late Colonel Harry McCalmont and R. C. Viner; also 29 yearlings, 10 weanlings and two stallions, one of which is the Virginian, a son of the Derby winner, Ayrshire.

Lumber Company Under Fire.
The Booth-Kelly Lumber company of Douglas county is being unmercifully scored by Wallamette valley papers for hiring a locater to come to the Dulles and get the first call on some choice timber land in the Cascades, just opened for settlement. The locater stood in line at the land office door for 48 hours awaiting an opportunity to file.

Lost His Hotel.
J. K. Rainwater of Dayton, Washington, who has just returned from a trip to California, had a novel experience while in San Francisco. He left his wife in their room at the hotel, and went for a walk. He forgot the name of his hotel, its location and all description of it and staid out until morning hunting for it by aid of the police.

Hopping interrupted.
The heavy rains in Washington have interrupted hopping in the Pryallup, Yakima, Kent and Auburn, yards and the British Columbia Indians who have been picking there have left for their homes.

Twenty-Year Franchise.
The county court of Spokane county granted a 20-year franchise yesterday to the Interstate Telephone Company. A new line will be built from Rathdrum, Idaho, to Spokane.

First Ginseng Crop.
The first ginseng crop to be raised in the West is to be planted by J. D. Laidlow, of Waiilatpu, this fall. He has ordered seed from Missouri for about 10,000 plants and will seed the ground next month.

Fulton Has Resigned.
Senator C. W. Fulton has tendered his resignation to Governor Chamberlain, as state senator from Clatsop county.

Five Mill Levy for Walla Walla.
In the Walla Walla school district it is expected to make a five mill special levy on a valuation of \$4,947,588.40, on Oct. 5.

W. B. Mynatt is under \$200 bonds at Long Creek for stealing a band of cattle from the Dougherty boys of that place.

Grade Too Heavy for Auto.

How to Sell a Crop and Still Have it. A great many farmers carry their crops for a long time after harvest waiting for an advance in prices. Those who need money can get a large part of the value of their crop out in money and still hold the grain for an advance in the following manner.

Suppose a farmer has 5,000 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 65 cents a bushel; let him sell it and receive \$3,250 in payment; then let him buy 5,000 bushels of May wheat and margin it 5 cents a bushel. This will require \$50,000. He will then have \$3,000 to use as he sees fit. If the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel, he will make \$500 the same as if he had held his 5,000 bushels of wheat in his granary.
