GENERAL NEWS.

The pallium will be conferred at Victoria, B. C., soon, upon Rev. Bertram Orth.

Appearances indicate that the Alaskan boundary commission will not be able to agree.

William J. Bryan, in the Commoner, suggests ex-Governor John E. Osborne, of Wyoming, for the democratic presidential nomination next year.

Prize shooter shot and killed Louis Zittel in New York City, in a quarrel over a trade, and then went home and committed suicide with the same weapon.

Henry Cargill, a member of the Canadian house of commons, finished a speech in the house Thursday and fell dead of heart disease a few minutes later.

Of 29,000 enlisted men in the American navy, 500 are negroes. They are to be weeded out by taking no more colored recruits, nor allowing colored men to re-enlist.

Times are very hard in South Africa owing to drought and the withdrawal of capital. Money can only be gotten at high interest rates, and business of every kind is embarrassed and practically at a standstill.

A cloudburst on the Nianguan river, Kansas, Thursday, did great damage. Three inches of rain fell in an hour. The Nianguan, ordinarily the dimensions of the Umatilla River, was a mile wide inside of two hours.

D. A. McRitchie, of Wiscasset, Me., made complete arrangements for the disposal of his effects and wrote letters to his friends informing them of his purpose to suicide. He then jumped off a pier in New York City, swam out 100 feet and sank.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

J. C. Schuenburg was killed by a falling tree, at Forest Grove, Friday.

The price of milk, sold from the wagons in Tacoma, has been advanced from 5 to 8 cents per quart.

Motie Rossett, the 4-year-old daughter of George Rossett, of Vancouver, was drowned in the Columbia, Friday.

The general merchandise store of Clark & Austin, of Flora, Walla Walla county, was robbed by two masked men, Thursday evening. Flora is 60 miles from Joseph, the county seat, and the robbers had a good start of the officers who are now in pursuit.

HEAVY FRUIT CROP

MILTON AND FREEWATER
YIELD ENORMOUS RETURNS.

Over 20,000 Crates of Berries Shipped Out—Forty Carloads of Prunes Marketed—Montana and Dakota Are Unfailing Markets.

No like area of fruit land on the Pacific Coast has produced more this year than the Milton and Free-water district. The soil is so well adapted to the growth of all kinds of fruit, the climate is so favorable and the water supply so abundant, that the greatest possible yield, has been produced there this year.

Beginning last May with dewberries, blackberries, strawberries and raspberries, the harvest has been continual since that time, and will yet last until the middle of November when the last of the winter apple crop will have been gathered.

While it is impossible to get the exact number of crates and boxes shipped from the entire district, those in touch with the situation know approximately what has been sent out.

Since the berry crop began to move last spring, a force of over 100 men, women and children has been constantly employed in the orchards and gardens, and in the berry picking season, fully 200 people working in the fruit business in that district.

The amount of berries sent out this year reached 20,000 crates of all kinds. Two carloads of cherries were hauled away by peddlers, which it would be impossible to estimate. The peach crop amounted to approximately 10 carloads, and the prune crop at least 40 carloads.

The prune crop was shipped out in the green state, and the principal market has been found in the Northwest, between the cities of Minneapolis and Butte. All the small Montana and Dakota towns along the Great Northern and Northern Pacific have bought liberally.

The peach crop was disposed of in Montana and Northern Idaho with a strong demand from Pendleton and the interior country.

The winter apple crop will amount to more than 50 carloads, and will go principally to the northwestern states and the cities of Chicago and Minneapolis. The quality of the winter apple crop is better this year than ever before. The spraying which was done last spring had a very beneficial effect on the crop and the pests are found to greatly diminished quantity.

The summer apple crop and the early fall apples amounted to about 10 carloads, of excellent quality. The apple acre is increasing in the Milton and Free-water district, faster than any other. The grape crop is one of the most important of the fruit crops, and each year finds a widening market for it.

There is some talk of establishing a cannery at Milton, for the purpose of handling the fruit that cannot be marketed to an advantage, and the surplus that is always found as the crops ripen, rapidly.

METHODIST CHURCH, SOUTH.

Record of Changes Made Since Conference—Rev. Howard to Pendleton.

Several weeks ago the changes made in the pastorates by the East Columbia Conference were noted and now those have been changed in part.

Rev. M. V. Howard, of Oakesdale, will come to Pendleton and have charge of the South Methodist church for the coming year. Mr. Howard was formerly of this city, and is well known here, where his services in the past were much appreciated by the members of his pastorate.

Rev. E. B. Jones, who has been in this city for the past two years, will be transferred to Oakesdale, where he will take the pulpit left vacant by the transfer of Rev. Howard. Mr. Jones has been earnest and faithful in his efforts here and his absence will be noted by all of those to whom he has ministered in the past.

Rev. A. L. Thoroughman, who was placed here by the first change, will go to Weston, where he will have that city under his charge for the coming year.

The changes will take place during the coming week.

The 55th annual session of the Congregational Association of Oregon closed an interesting and profitable session at Oregon City yesterday.

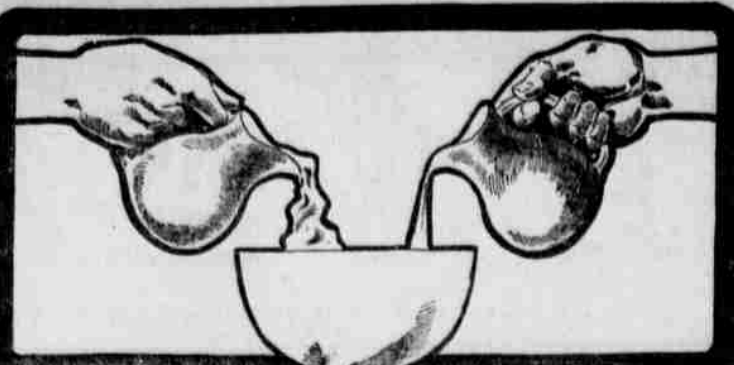
The reports of officers and boards show a very prosperous condition. The amount raised during the past year for foreign missions in the state was \$832.
