GENERAL NEWS

Exports from the Philippines have increased 20 per cent during the past year, most of the increase going to the United States.

Hugh McNulty, a wealthy beef merchant of New York, died on his knees at prayer in the Church of the Ascension, at New York, Sunday last.

Of 3,000 press feeders in Chicago, 1,000 are on strike because 1,800 feeders belong to an independent union which does not recognize other labor organizations.

George Hoether, his wife and four children, were riding in a row boat which capsized Sunday at Caserville, Mich. Three of the children were drowned and the father went insane.

The Philippine council of Moro province, has passed a law imposing severe penalties upon slave dealing and slave hunting and providing for the confiscation of all vessels in the slave trade.

John Greening, a stoker on the American liner, Westernland, bound from Liverpool to New York, went suddenly insane September 25 and jumped into the sea. The body was not recovered.

A color rush at Buchtel College, Akron, O., has resulted in every student but three in the institution being suspended. The rush was a disgraceful affair, resulting in torn clothes and bloody noses by the wholesale.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Gilbert Hunt, mayor of Walla Walla, announced in Seattle Monday that under no circumstances would he be a candidate for governor of Washington.

"Count" Pulaski, who is now in jail at Portland for robbery, is wanted in Walla Walla by about a score of anxious creditors. The palmer left that city in the night.

Jason Doud, a miner of Wadsworth, Or., is lost in the mountains near the Crooked river mines in Southern Oregon and friends have failed to find any trace of him.

The Portland Federated Trades has asked the American Federation of Labor to remove G. Y. Harry, a organizer of labor unions in Oregon, on the grounds of extravagance and inactivity.

The striking linemen of Spokane, who have had their grievances with the telephone company settled, refuse to return to work unless the company takes care of the girls who are yet on a strike.

October 5 was the date set by the dynamiters on the Northern Pacific, on which the company should pay over \$50,000 blackmail. Nothing was heard from the parties on that date, and it is supposed the plan has failed.

J. W. Schultz, the guide who accompanied young Pulitzer on the Montana hunting trip, last spring, when the young sportsman killed, illegally, several mountain sheep, is now under arrest on the same charge.

John Peterson, an insane man, escaped from St. Vincent's hospital, in Portland, Monday, and terrorized a residence district by running naked around several blocks, chasing hired girls, babies, dogs and street cars, indiscriminately.

GRAIN PROSPECTS

EXCELLENT ALL OVER NORTH SIDE OF COUNTY.

Good Rain Has Fallen Which Makes Excellent Fall Range and Puts Ground in Shape for Plowing—About the Usual Acreage Fall Wheat Will Be Sown—Better Yield This Year Than Was Expected.

W. M. Scott of Helix was in the city last evening and reports an excellent rain all over the country north of Pendleton.

The crops were all gathered in the Helix district before the rain came, and seeding is now in full blast. This rain has been a boon to the farmer and the stockman, as it prepared the ground for the fall sowing and also made excellent fall range.

Seeding has been in progress in the Athena and Weston districts for some time, but the ground was in poor condition and the dust was very bad. This rain was very welcome in that locality also, even although some of the late crops on Weston mountain barely escaped a wetting.

Mr. Scott says the acreage of fall wheat in the Helix district will be about as usual and the farmers will hurry the seeding while this favorable weather lasts. Most of the farmers will hold their wheat crop for higher prices, believing that the sharp demand for export wheat, later, will bring up the price to a better figure than now prevails.

Mr. Scott sold 1,500 sacks early in the season, and will hold the remainder for higher prices. One fact becoming more noticeable in the farming communities, each year, is the ability of the farmer to hold his crop over. Many of the farmers who were formerly compelled to sell in the fall, are now in such condition that they can hold until the market suits them.

Everybody in the Helix district was happily surprised in their crop returns this year, as the yield in nearly every instance was larger than expected, following such a dry season.

Tacoma, Oct. 6.—A romance of the hop fields, in which a dusky Indian maid and a big brave of the tribe were the principals, developed at Payupall yesterday, when it was discovered that Simon Charley, a stalwart red man, had eloped with Nettie Lewis, the comely 15-year-old daughter of Dick Lewis, a prominent member of the tribe occupying the Skykomish reservation.

Dick Lewis and his family had been engaged in the hop fields for the past seven weeks, and there it was that the pretty Indian girl and Simon Charley struck up a close friendship. On account of the youth of the girl the father had watched the growing intimacy with increasing disfavor, and yesterday afternoon when the girl failed to return to the wigwam of her father at the usual time, search was instituted, but neither the girl Nettie nor Simon Charley were to be found, and the conclusion was that the two had eloped together.

DEATH OF A TOWN.

Close of the Postoffice Marks the Final Abandonment of Old Auburn.

Auburn, in Baker county, once the mecca of Eastern Oregon, is no more. The postoffice has just been ordered closed by the department and the postmaster has removed to Baker City, to mingle with civilization once more.

In 1861 Auburn contained about 5,000 people. It was the largest city in the state, outside of Portland, at that time, and transacted a wonderful business, all the current money being gold dust. It was the richest placer camp at one time, north of the California camps, and was a commercial and mining center for the north-west.

Gradually the other camps in Eastern Oregon were discovered and the population of Auburn scattered. It long remained a headquarters for large Chinese companies, who operated the old diggings as long as they would pay, and for the past ten years it has been the home of a very few wood choppers and one or two old prospectors, who still hang around the gulches where the fabulous pockets of early days had been found.

TO BUILD CANNERY

LEWISTON PEOPLE CONSIDER THE PROPOSITION.

Seattle Man Will Transfer His Plant to Snake River City—Will Invest in Idaho Property and Prepare to Use up Surplus Produce.

At a conference of the business men held yesterday it was decided to call a meeting of the governing board of the Commercial club for next Tuesday evening to consider the proposition of John Walsh for the establishing of a cannery at Lewiston, says the Lewiston Tribune. It is understood that the proposition of Mr. Walsh is to furnish the cannery plant which he now has in good repair at Seattle, and the business men of the city form a stock company of \$5,000, to furnish the grounds and building and pay the expenses of moving the plant from Seattle here. Besides doing this the sum asked would furnish a working capital with which to commence operations.

The business men are taking very kindly to the proposition and it is probable that a decided action will be taken at the meeting next Tuesday evening.

Mr. Walsh is a man well versed in every department of the cannery business and is prepared with convincing evidence of the profits of the business and the great benefits an industry would be to a country so rich in horticultural and agricultural products.

A cannery of small capacity was started at North Yakima last spring at an expense of about \$2,800, and on account of the showing made, even with so small a plant, the business men of that city have increased the capital stock to \$20,000 to purchase machinery of greater capacity and to erect such buildings as will be needed to accommodate the enlarged establishment.

The establishing of such a plant in Lewiston would assure a ready market for all garden produce and fruits that will ever be raised in the Lewiston valley.
