THROCGH DESERT LAND ACT PUBLIC DOMAIN DISAPPEARS.

Opposition to Repeal in the West Comes From All Quarters-East Must Bring Pressure to Bear to Save Public Lands.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 6.—(To the Editor.)—The strong and deter-mined opposition developed at the recent National Irrigation Congress Ogden, to the propose; repeal some of our abused land laws inof some of our abused land laws in-dicates that if there is to be any changing or an enough of these laws it will be done only through a thor-ough understanding of their iniqui-tous features and an awakening of the people to a realization of the fact that under them immense quantities of valuable government property are passing into the hands of private cor-porations and speculators for a mere

tithe of their value to the nation.

A resolution was introduced at the congress by George H. Maxwell, the executive chairman of the National Irrigation association—the same reso-letion which was passed by the last Trans-Mississippi Congress, quoting the president's words in denuncia-tion of these laws and calling upon the United States Congress for their

Congressmen from both Wyoming and Idaho vigorously opposed such action and in a speech to the Irrigation Congress Representative Mon-deil of Wyoming strennously defended all the land laws, especially the Desert Land Law, which he stated had been of great benefit to Wyom-

California and Montana denounced of California and Montain denounced all three laws as having been the cause of enormous areas of public land passing fraudulently into private ownership, and Senator Gibson of Montana and Mr. Maxwell both quoted Land Office figures to show that unless something is done to pre-vent the absorption of these lands the great bulk of the remaining desi-rable and arable public lands will. in a very few years, have entirely asappeared.

Under a proper timber law the govrnment income from cimber sales would be far greater than at present and in any event the above is a preposterous reason to advance, because if these laws are left intact, and the absorption of the public domain un-der them continues as at present, there will soon be no government land left for reclamation under the irri-

Now the proposition is to repeat these three laws. It will be necessary to have some additional legislation regarding the sale of timber. strong point made by the opponents of the repeal of these laws is that such action would cut off the contri-butions to the irrigation fund, which derive dfrom the sale of public

Looking to the East.

The strength to insure the repeal or these laws must come from the East. The fight in the irrigation congress shows the opposition which gress shows the opposition which gress shows the opposition which can be expected in certain sections of the West and in order to secure the public domain from speculation and to keep it intact against the time when it shall be needed by the settler, eastern sentiment must become aroused to the situation. Western opposition and eastern apathy are the stumbling blocks.
