

WESTON WILL GIVE FREE EN-TERTAINMENT TO TEACHERS.

Judge Lowell to Deliver Lecture on "Horace Mann" - Superintendent Ackerman Will Also Lecture-Large Attendance of Teachers Expected-Weston Schools in Good Condition.

County Superintendent of Public Schools J. F. Nowlin, returned last evening from Weston, where he as-sisted in arranging the program for the Umatilla County Teachers' Insti-tute, to be held in that city on November 4, 5 and\*6.

The program is not yet ready for publication, but a review of its main features follows:

The people of Weston and the of-ficials and students of the State Normai School at that place, have ar-ranged to accommodate all the visiting teachers at the institute, free of charge. The teachers will be met at the train and conducted to various bomes in the city, where they will be entertained during the sessions of the institute.

Professor Nowlin is enthusiastic in his praise for the manner in which the people of Weston are taking up the arrangements for the meeting the Normal school, both students nad and officials, are taking a deep interost.

On the first evening of the institute, November 4, Judge Lowell will seliver a lecture on "Horace Mann," and on the second evening State Su perintendent J. H. Ackerman will lec ture on "The Trend of Education-What Is it?"

The meetings will be held in the hapel hall of the Weston State Normal school, and a fine musical pro gram has been arranged by the citi zens to be interspersed among the numbers of the official program 101 the institute.

From all advance arrangements this will be the most interesting session of the county institute ever held and owing to the free entertainment the teachers during their stay in Weston, every teacher in the county can afford to attend, as the train fare will be the only necessary expense Prefessor Nowlin visited the pub-school at Weston and also the the State Normal and finds both institu-tions in the meat satisfactory condition The Weston public school under the management of Prof. Paul Wyman, a graduate of the Monmouth Normal school, is making excellent showing and is one of the very best public schools in the county. 
the clubs, will be selected. The efforts of the Woman's Club this year will be largely given to practical work in co-operation with the public schools, Professor Conkin, at the head of
