COUNTY INSTITUTE

WESTON WILL GIVE FREE ENTERTAINMENT TO TEACHERS.

Judge Lowell to Deliver Lecture on "Horace Mann" — Superintendent Ackerman Will Also Lecture—Large Attendance of Teachers Expected—Weston Schools in Good Condition.

County Superintendent of Public Schools J. F. Nowlin, returned last evening from Weston, where he assisted in arranging the program for the Umatilla County Teachers' Institute, to be held in that city on November 4, 5 and 6.

The program is not yet ready for publication, but a review of its main features follows:

The people of Weston and the officials and students of the State Normal School at that place, have arranged to accommodate all the visiting teachers at the institute, free of charge. The teachers will be met at the train and conducted to various homes in the city, where they will be entertained during the sessions of the institute.

Professor Nowlin is enthusiastic in his praise for the manner in which the people of Weston are taking up the arrangements for the meeting and the Normal school, both students and officials, are taking a deep interest.

On the first evening of the institute, November 4, Judge Lowell will deliver a lecture on "Horace Mann," and on the second evening State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman will lecture on "The Trend of Education—What Is It?"

The meetings will be held in the chapel hall of the Weston State Normal school, and a fine musical program has been arranged by the citizens to be interspersed among the numbers of the official program of the institute.

From all advance arrangements, this will be the most interesting session of the county institute ever held and owing to the free entertainment of the teachers during their stay in Weston, every teacher in the county can afford to attend, as the train fare will be the only necessary expense.

Professor Nowlin visited the public school at Weston and also the State Normal and finds both institutions in the most satisfactory condition. The Weston public school, under the management of Prof. Paul Wyman, a graduate of the Monmouth Normal school, is making excellent showing and is one of the very best public schools in the county. The Normal is equipped with new apparatus, and has added new departments, until it is now one of the best educational institutions in the state.

The efficient corps of teachers and the advanced methods of teaching prepare the graduates for the highest success in their vocation, and the attendance this year is greater by one-third than ever before.

LAND CONTEST CASE.

E. E. Lahue's Homestead Contested by Jefferson Cunningham.

A contest case was argued yesterday afternoon before Joe Parks, acting as commissioner, in which the contentions of Jefferson Cunningham and Elmer E. Lahue were aired. The land in question is the northeast quarter of section 23, in township 4, north of range 30 east, being a tract of 160 acres about 20 miles north of Pendleton.

The contest was on the ground of abandonment. Lahue had homesteaded the land in October, 1900, but according to the plea of the contestant had failed to establish a residence on the place. For this reason Cunningham filed on the land and now claims it. H. E. Collier represented Cunningham in the case, and J. H. Raley was the attorney for Lahue.

All of the local clubs will hold regular meetings next week. The Thursday Afternoon Club will be entertained by Mrs. J. Halley, Jr., and Mrs. E. S. Burroughs at the home of Mrs. Halley. "Robert and Elizabeth Barrett Browning" will be the title of the afternoon's program.

The Woman's Club will hold its first meeting for the year Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 at the Commercial Association rooms. This meeting will be of interest to every club woman in the city.

The presidents of the clubs held a conference with Professor Conklin this week in regard to another art exhibit, and at the meeting the matter of framing and hanging the pictures already on hand, was discussed. Professor Conklin asked for a committee from the clubs to meet with the teachers to attend to this work. A report of the conference will be given at the club meeting Tuesday, and a committee, representing all of the clubs, will be selected.

The efforts of the Woman's Club this year will be largely given to practical work in co-operation with the public schools.

Professor Conklin, at the head of the city, and Professor Ackerman, of the state educational interests, have asked for the assistance of the clubs and federation, particularly on the lines of manual training now being introduced in our schools.

Our mayor, Mr. T. G. Halley, will speak to the club on the subject of its aid in entertaining the city's guests at the coming irrigation convention. The subjects of forestry and irrigation have been well studied by the clubs of our arid states, and the California and Washington federations have strong state committees to look after these interests and send out lecturers and printed matter all over the states, to encourage public interest and create public opinion. It is perhaps unnecessary to say that our mayor will find the Woman's Club ready to lend any aid in its power to further the interests of Pendleton, Umatilla county, Oregon and the Northwest.

In view of all this, it is hoped that every club woman in the city who can possibly do so, will be present at 2:30 at next Tuesday's meeting. It might be added, at this time, that the Woman's Club membership is unlimited, and its object is to help in such ways as united and organized effort on the part of the intelligent public-spirited women of this city may, in the social and educational life of Pendleton.
