COURT ON MONDAY

LARGE NUMBER OF CASES TO BE DECIDED.

There Are Many Criminal Cases, But None of Thrilling Importance—They Range From Larceny to Horsestealing—Many Civil Cases—Several for Recovering of Alleged Damages From O. R. & N.

On Monday next, the circuit court for this district will convene in regular session and at this time a great number of cases will be placed before the court for its decision. There are about 75 cases on the law docket and more than 100 on the civil list. Of course most of these will not come to trial at this session of the court, but there will be enough to occupy the attention of the judge for the coming two weeks.

In the criminal and law docket there are but few of more than passing importance and none of thrilling interest. The character of the cases range from simple larceny to forgery, horse stealing and graver crimes, but in all the list none of them is of much interest to the general public.

The law docket as compiled at this time is as follows:

October 12, State vs. Basil Parr. This is a case of larceny by bailee, and is the companion to an action brought at the same time for obtaining money under false pretenses. It is alleged that on May 1 Parr stole a horse belonging to Thomas Shalil, of the reservation and later sold the animal to A. McMaisters for \$20. The horse was valued at \$40.

W. F. Earnhart vs. B. E. Kennedy. This is an action brought in the first place to recover commission alleged to be due the plaintiff on a real estate trade. The matter was tried in the justice court and appealed to the circuit. It was decided in the first place in favor of the defendant.

October 13, State vs. Albert A. Nelson. This is the case in which C. L. Hastings alleges that the men in custody took from him \$200 in coin while he was in an intoxicated condition.

Firemen's Fund Insurance Company and Northwest Warehouse Company vs. the O. R. & N. This is an action brought to recover on money and wheat stored in the warehouses which were set afire by the engines of the road.

October 14, State vs. George Morris, larceny from the person. This is the case in which the defendant is accused of having taken \$60 from Arthur Williams, who was rooming at the Gratz lodging house.

State vs. William Webb, larceny by bailee. This is the man who rented the rig at Freewater and sold it to Carney, the livery stable man, of this city. The theft occurred on August 6.

State vs. Henry Anderson forgery. This is the man who passed the check for \$35 on the Last Chance saloon on August 6.

October 15, State vs. Richard Ryan, larceny from the person. Ryan is the notorious man of the city who has been in the city and county jail for the greater part of the summer. He took \$6.50 from a man by the name of Thomas in the Schmitt saloon on September 5.

October 16, Louis Anderson vs. the O. R. & N., an action for damages alleged to be due as the result of wheat destroyed in a fire presumably set by an engine.

October 17, Norwich Union vs. the O. R. & N., a case involving the damage due on a quantity of wheat destroyed by fire.

October 19, Manchester Association vs. the O. R. & N., a case brought to recover damages on wheat destroyed in a warehouse in this county.

October 20, Elizabeth Adcock vs. O. R. & N. A case asking for damages received at the hands of the company.

October 21, First National Bank of Walla Walla vs. McDonald. A suit to recover on money loaned.

The cases on the equity docket will not come until after the other portion of the work of the term is off and finished.

GENERAL NEWS.

Hamilton Fish, associate United States treasurer, is seriously ill at New York with appendicitis. An operation may be necessary.

Four robbers tried to crack the courthouse safe at Scotland, N. D., but they were caught in the act. One was captured and one wounded.

An anti-dyspeptic club has been formed at Jersey City. The object is to inculcate and foster the habit of feeding upon homely, substantial food.

William Macqueen, the anarchist who was sentenced to five years for rioting at Paterson, N. J., and who escaped, has been caught in London through his writing letters.

The home of Foster McConnell, a constable at Joplin, Mo., was dynamited early yesterday morning. His little children were hurt. McConnell had earned the enmity of the tough element by making several arrests.

The four tramps who brutally murdered L. C. Daro on top of a box car near Minneapolis, Thursday, are still at large. He had worked on a ranch all summer and saved his money, all of which the hoboes secured. They shot him down in cold blood.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

It is rumored that Darius Miller of Butte, will succeed President Mellen, of the Northern Pacific.

Arlando E. Bloom, a pioneer of Albany, died of sciatic rheumatism Friday, aged 70 years. He came to Oregon in 1847.

Jerry Comba and James Lewis fell 1000 feet down a shaft of the Parrot mine, at Butte, Friday. Comba was instantly killed and Lewis is fatally injured.

Jack Ashmead, one of the Ben Holiday stage drivers, and one of the last of the veteran drivers of the coast, died Friday at Turner, Or., aged 77 years.

The third trial of Jefferson Gibson, who murdered B. Schonbacher at Grant's Pass, last May, is now being held at that city. Over 70 witnesses have been heard so far.

The special election called in King county, Washington, in which \$600,000 in bonds were to be voted for the improvement of the courthouse, has been abandoned.

John R. Huffer, a miner at Jacksonville, Or., found an apple tree this week, growing and loaded with fine fruit, in an almost inaccessible canyon, miles from any road or trail in Josephine county.

Four Chinese gardeners near North Yakima, were robbed by bandits Friday. The Chinese were left tied to bedposts in their house, and were released five hours afterward by neighbors passing the place.

The state board of barber examiners have just passed a resolution, which provides that two permits to work shall not be granted to the same barber. If a man fails to pass the examination, after having one permit granted, he will be barred out of the trade in this state.

Joe Leonard, assistant keeper of the Tillamook Rock lighthouse, dropped dead Friday, in Astoria. Leonard recently fell from the rock to the beach, while receiving supplies from the tender, and it is thought was internally injured. One leg and arm were broken in the fall.

SEEDING IN PROGRESS.

Recent Rains Have Prepared the Ground Just Right for Fall Crops.

E. B. McFarland, of Adams, is in the city today on business and pleasure combined, and reports seeding in the vicinity of Adams in full blast.

The recent rains have prepared the ground in excellent condition and the farmers are taking advantage of it. One good feature of the rains is that it started the weeds to growing and in seeding they will be killed out almost entirely, where if the rains had not come before the fields were seeded the weeds would have come up with the grain. The acreage of fall grain sown in the Adams district will be about the same as usual, and most of the farmers' summer fallowing next year, will plant corn for the purpose of resting the land from the wheat crop.

Rice Merchants in Trouble. For some time past Chinese merchants at Seattle have been importing large quantities of what was labeled uncleaned rice. The duty on uncleaned rice is 1 1/4 cent per pound, but on cleaned rice it is 2 cents per pound. Owing to the cheap labor in the country where the rice is grown, it is cleaned there and then to escape the high duty, it was shipped here as uncleaned. The customs officials at Seattle have learned of the deception and will collect back duty on large shipments recently made.
