GENERAL NEWS.

The medical schools of Nashville, Tenn., graduate more doctors than those of Berlin, Germany.

The total of the first two days' registration in Greater New York is 394,874, against 286,668 last year.

Samuel Williams, of Starke, Fla., was lynched by a mob because he refused to tell the whereabouts of his brother.

The Illinois Steel Company, of Joliet, Ill., has suspended operations, throwing nearly 1,000 men out of employment.

The Truck Teamsters' Union of Chicago, representing 8,000 men, has demanded higher wages. They want an increase of 10 per cent.

About 10,000,000 cattle are now to be found in the Argentine Republic. They are said to be all descendants of eight cows and one bull which were taken to Brazil in the 16th century.

The latest theft in the Standard Oil Company is the tapping of its mains near Echo, W. Va., in which thousands of gallons have been stolen.

After being run down by three possums, wounded and worn out by trying to escape, Joseph Roberts, a desperate outlaw, of Arizona, has surrendered.

Right Rev. Francis Bourne, who has been appointed archbishop at Westminster, is, with one exception, the youngest of the Roman Catholic bishops of England.

In some sections of Texas cotton growing is being abandoned because of the boll weevil pest, and the land is being turned over to other crops, while in some cases Texas cotton growers are moving to Oklahoma and Indian Territory where the boll weevil has not yet reached.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mrs. James Woody, of Colfax, suicided Sunday by cutting her throat, while in a demented condition.

H. W. Perpinney, justice of the peace at Elk, Wash., dropped dead from heart disease Saturday evening, while walking home from town.

Mrs. H. Melis, wife of the United States land commissioner at Havre, Mont., accidentally shot herself with a 22-calibre rifle, Saturday night. She cannot recover.

Orsen W. Dunsmuir, of Benton county, was drowned in Soap Creek, near Albany, Sunday morning, while attempting to cross with a horse and cart. The body was recovered.

G. W. Lounsbury, who has been commercial agent for the O. R. & N. at Astoria for a number of years, has resigned on account of failing health. He has been with the company for 23 years.

A special train loaded with deputy sheriffs and bloodhounds, was sent from Helena over the Northern Pacific westward Sunday, in search of dynamiters who were said to be operating along the line in Montana on that day.

Oliver Marshall, who escaped from the insane asylum Friday, was caught at Oregon City Saturday evening. Marshall was serving a life sentence in the penitentiary for murder, from Baker county, and was sent to the asylum a short time ago on account of increasing dementia. He will be returned to the penitentiary.

NEGRO WAS CAUGHT

IS THOUGHT TO HAVE SEPARATED KAMELA FAMILY.

Worked in the Woods in This County in 1901—Found Sauntering on Front Street in Portland, but Disclaims any Knowledge of Mrs. Murchison.

"Nigger Tom," who is said to have eloped with a Mrs. Murchison of Sumnerville last week, has been located by Portland police in that city, but no woman was found with him and he disclaims any knowledge of Mrs. Murchison's whereabouts.

When found he was sauntering on Front street, seemingly unoccupied, and was at once taken to police headquarters, where he affected the greatest surprise upon hearing that he was accused of eloping with a white woman from La Grande. Having no warrant for him, the police were obliged to turn him loose. He will be shadowed until his white paramour is found, if she is in Portland.

"Nigger Tom" worked at Kamela, in this county, during the summer of 1901 and through his meddling in family affairs, it is alleged a Poland named Trzinski was separated from his wife and disappeared from his home and has not since been heard from.

Trzinski was a hard working wood chopper, with some means, and married a Polish woman, whom he found through a matrimonial agency in Portland. She had been married several times before, and was a very comely woman of middle age.

She came to La Grande from Portland and not having means to buy her ticket to Kamela, walked the distance, 19 miles, in one day, and was met by Trzinski. They lived together on his claim three miles from Kamela for about one year, leading seemingly happy lives.

During the summer of 1901 "Nigger Tom" came to work for Trzinski in the woods, and soon after his arrival the Trzinski's separated and Trzinski left the country, and has not been heard of since. Mrs. Trzinski sold off the property and went to Elgin where she was later married to an aged farmer who was very wealthy. It was thought by many of those who inquired into the case that this woman and the negro were acquainted in Portland. Soon after the Trzinski's left Kamela, "Tom" went to La Grande and started a boot-black stand, where he has remained most of the time since, working in the country at times during the busy season.

CITY RECORDS UP IN SMOKE.

Baker City Council Chamber Burns With Its Contents.

Baker City, Oct. 12.—(Special to the East Oregonian.)—The old city hall, containing 37 years' records of the municipality of Baker City, was destroyed by fire at 9:30 Saturday night.

The old building has been considered a fire trap for years and was recently moved to one side of the city hall premises to make room for the new \$40,000 hall now being built.

At the urgent request of the citizens the city books were to be exported and the accountants were in the midst of this work at the time of the fire. The old safe was too small to hold all the city records and some of the most valuable of the city papers were left outside.

It is openly declared by many prominent citizens that the fire was started by some one interested in having the records out of the way. The new hall will be completed in about another month and the city headquarters will then be second to none in Eastern Oregon, but the loss of the records will throw the city government into temporary chaos.
