### VAST IRRIGATION SCHEME.

Idaho Canal Will Reclaim 270,000 Acres of Desert Land.

Speaking of the completion of the greatest irrigation project now un-der way in the west the Boise States-

The Twin Fails canal will be miles long and will carry water for the reclamation of 270,000 acres of land. Work, both on the dam and the ditch, was begun last March. The first 25 miles of the ditch is already sufficiently under way sure its completion in time for irrigation next summer.

About 60,000 acres of land will be open for settlement next year, and it is proposed to turn in the water on the first 25 miles of ditch and irrigate this tract.

The remainder of the ditch be completed in time for the followwell ing season.
