Some of the finest California grapes ever seen in the markets in this city are now on hand at prices quoted below. The vegetable market has been more brisk for the past few days than usually on account of the great amount now being stored away for winter use. Many people have ordered their winter supplies, also, and this feature of the market is very active. A fine quality of home-grown potatoes is coming in and river bottom cabbage from near town is finding ready sale for the supply of kraut. The apple supply from Umatilla county is more free from pests this fall than for many years and an excellent quality is being handled. RETAIL GROCERY PRICES. California sweet potatoes, 5c per pound. ON FLAX CULTURE. Promoter of the Salem Factory Gives Out Information. J. D. Bosse, who will start the flax mill near Salem next spring, gives out the following information for the farmers intending to grow it: "The flax mill for the crop of 1904 will be located on the Savage farm, adjoining the asylum. Its capacity shall be to work up 1,000 acres of flax annually, and may be enlarged if necessary. "I have seed in this mill to seed 600 acres next spring. "I sell the seed pure, at \$1.50 per bushel (56 pounds) and take the price out of the crop when hauled to the mill. "It requires from seventy to ninety pounds of seed per acre, according to the strength of the land. "The principal point to grow clean, healthy crop, which is necessary to be valuable, is that the land be freed from weeds, such as wild oats, etc. "The amount of straw per acre is from one and a half to four tons; two farmers at Selma made nearly \$50 per acre with pulled flax at \$12 per ton this season. "When a good crop of wheat, barley or corn is expected a good crop of flax would be more certain. "The best time to sow flax in the Willamette valley is from the 20th of April to the 15th of May, though a fair crop may be grown after the 20th of May. A Cure For Dyspepsia. SAVE THE PUMPKIN. Washington Monster to go to St. Louis. The big 185-pound pumpkin exhibit at the Stevens county booth at the Interstate fair, and which took first prize, is destined to dazzle the world at the St. Louis exposition if formaldehyde and cotton can accomplish its preservation, says the Spokane Press. Yesterday afternoon under the direction of Executive Commissioner Johnston of the Washington commissioners, a rectangle was cut out of the big pumpkin and the seed removed. Through the opening the rolls of cotton batting were punched, while the lines of incision were sealed up and the whole saturated with formaldehyde. Applications without number were made to Messrs. I. E. Crozier and Morley of the Stevens county exhibit for seeds of the monster, but the trio proclaimed loudly that the state commissioners' men and captured the seeds. In fact the Stevens county men had secreted them. If the old pumpkin stands the embalming process its children may be seen along side of it in the exhibit at St. Louis. The idea of the Stevens county people is to plant each of the 547 seeds of the mammoth pumpkin and as next season goes on exhibit at St. Louis the progeny in successive stages of development. How to Sell a Crop and Still Have It. Suppose a farmer has 5,000 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 65 cents a bushel; let him sell it and receive \$3,250 in payment; then let him buy 5,000 bushels of May wheat and margin it 5 cents a bushel. This will require \$350,000. He will then have \$1,000 to use as he sees fit. If the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel, he will make \$250,000 the same as if he had held his 5,000 bushels of wheat in his granary.
