GENERAL NEWS.

The Philippine exhibit for the St. Louis World's Fair has been shipped. There are 2,300 tons of stuff.

The bank of Viberg, S. D., was robbed Thursday night of \$5,000. The thieves escaped with their booty.

Robbers blew the safe of the Linn Grove, Iowa, postoffice Thursday night, and secured \$2,500 in stamps and money.

An automobile owned by Mrs. C. C. Phipps, of Denver, ran down and killed S. H. Collins, a workman, in New York City.

A shipbuilding concern at Belfast, Eng. has contracted with the United States Steel corporation for 150,000 tons of steel per year.

Miss Mary Beach Tenzy died at New York City, aged 70 years. She left a grateful memory to her relatives and her entire fortune of \$250,000 to various missionary societies.

The 300 freight handlers of Kansas City who struck in June last, were beaten at every turn. All their places have been filled by non-union men, and their protests are unavailing.

A gang of horse thieves attempted a wholesale theft of horses from the Fort Peck Indian reservation in Montana, Thursday night. The Indians killed two and chased the rest away, and did not lose a horse.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

George Sewell is under arrest at Joseph for holding and robbing Dan Campbell, a miner, Friday morning, of \$15 in gold.

William Smith, arrested for selling liquor to an Indian at La Grande, has been released on account of his ignorance of the law.

R. D. Hume, the fish magnate on Rogue River, got damages of \$1 from the editor of the Grant's Pass Observer, for libel, Friday.

E. W. Davis, register of the La Grande land office, has resigned as chairman of the Union county republican central committee.

A lone highwayman held up and robbed the Rockford-Beil Grove stage in Idaho, Friday. There were no passengers. The driver was relieved of \$32.

A Seattle dispatch from Nome says three masked men held up R. D. Hunter, of the Ophir Creek mines, on October 12, and robbed him of \$7,000 in gold dust.

The Washington & Oregon and the Vancouver & North Yakima railway companies have been consolidated and will be operated under the direction of the Northern Pacific.

Helen Kelly was shot and instantly killed at Butte Friday, by Albert Beckman, a jilted lover, who claims he advanced her \$300 with which to buy wedding garments. Beckman escaped.

Ben Michaels, George Dubley and Fred A. Rodgers are under arrest at Colfax for kidnapping a negro boy at Spokane and converting him into a "wild girl" for a side show at the county fair.

An unexploded charge of dynamite was found under the rails of the Northern Pacific track near Elrasaye, Mont., Friday. It is thought to be a charge put in place by the black-mallers who have threatened to destroy all the bridges on the line if \$50,000 was not paid to them.
