Suppose a farmer has 5,000 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 65 cents a bushel; let him sell it and receive \$3,250 in payment; then let him buy 5,000 bush-els of May wheat and margin it 5 cents a bushel. This will require \$350,00. He will then have \$3,000 to use as he sees fit If the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel, he will make \$250 the same as if he had held his 5,000 bushels of

wheat in his granary.


