GENERAL NEWS.

Albert Jaenadt, a letter carrier in Chicago, has been arrested on the charge of stealing money contained in the letters he carried.

An amendment against the second reading of the national transcontinental railway bill at Ottawa, Ont., was defeated in the senate Saturday night, 14 to 21, a strictly party vote.

At Beaumont, Texas, careful estimates of the amount of oil storage in the Beaumont, Sour Lake and Saratoga fields show 13,500,000 barrels in these and intervening sections.

The International Bank & Trust Company of America, at Mexican City, W. H. Hunt, president, with branches in New York and San Francisco, and various points throughout Mexico, closed its doors this morning in voluntary liquidation.

The registration for the coming New York election, at the close of the books Saturday, was 138,650, making a total for the four days of 629,933. The total registration for the preceding three years was: 1900, 640,778; 1901, 644,141; 1902, 582,931.

Although neither ever was heard to utter a cross word to the other, Isaac P. Beach, of Bradford, Conn., has brought divorce proceedings against Mrs. Beach on the ground of intolerable cruelty. They have been married 10 years. Both are deaf mutes, and the testimony will be given by witnesses similarly afflicted.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Returning American miners from Alaska, say that the government methods of Canada, in the Yukon territory are worse than no government.

The Butte Miner won a case Saturday evening in which a local physician had sued it for \$50,000 damages for an editorial on the killing of Dr. Cayley last spring.

All tents belonging to the Washington National Guard have been sent by the governor to the homeless people at Aberdeen, which was destroyed by fire Friday.

Albert Beckmann, who shot and killed Miss Kelly in Butte, Friday morning, was captured Saturday night while making his way out of the state on a stolen track velocipede. A lynching is feared.

Letson Balliet, manager of the White Swan mine near Baker City, has begun a mandamus suit against the postmaster-general, to compel him to admit White Swan literature into the United States mail.

J. B. Chamberlain, one of the characters in Bret Harte's "Tennessee Partner," committed suicide Sunday at Chinese Camp, California, by shooting himself. He was 82 years old and had grown despondent.

The Northern Pacific telegraph operator at Welch's Spur, 20 miles from Butte, prevented a hold-up Saturday evening by flashing a message to an approaching passenger train at the first station west of Welch, of the danger. Two bandits rode into Welch and compelled the operator, F. K. Law, to set the signal to stop the train, after which he was ordered to stay inside and the office was locked. The train received the warning and dashed through the station 40 miles an hour.

YOUNG MEN RALLY

BIG ASSEMBLY IS HELD
AT THE BAPTIST CHURCH.

Mrs. Hattie M. Graves, of Centralia, Wash., Speaks Entertainingly on Work in Other Fields—Treasurer's Report Shows That \$1,150 Had Been Collected, But Expenditures Exceeded Receipts by \$100, Which is Made Up at the Meeting.

A large and enthusiastic congregation assembled in the Baptist church Sunday afternoon to listen to the reports from the Men's Resort.

Mrs. Hattie M. Graves, of Centralia, Wash., spoke for 10 minutes of the work in other fields and warmly commended the work being done here. Mrs. M. Wade, of Seattle, entertained the audience with a selection from "Josiah Allen's Wife," entitled "One Standard of Prity for Both Sexes." Messrs. Oster, Nolt, French and Esterbrook spoke of the work of the resort as they had observed it during the 15 months of its existence.

The treasurer's report showed that \$1,150 had been collected from all sources, \$350 of which had been spent in furnishing the rooms, the current expense for rent, light, fuel, janitor and incidentals amounting to \$900. This showed a deficit of \$100 and the audience was asked to make up this amount.

The entire amount was pledged to be paid November 1. This will start the institution on the winter work free of debt.

The board of directors is arranging to enlarge the quarters in order to provide an amusement room for the members during the winter months. The resort is now an established work on a good basis with a bright future before it.

Mrs. Graves and Mrs. Wade will give a recital in the Baptist church on Tuesday evening for the benefit of the resort, and everybody is invited to come.

Rev. Levi Johnson, founder of the Men's Resort, left on No. 1 for his home in Portland, very much pleased with the results of his visit to Pendleton in the interests of the resort. E. G. Esterbrook will continue to serve as superintendent and Charles Bennett will do the janitor work and collecting.

BIG BEND IRRIGATION.

Central Washington to be reclaimed by Water From Pend d'Oreille.

A party of government surveyors belonging to the hydrographic department of the government geological survey corps, have been camped near town this week, and are engaged in establishing elevation stakes across the Big Bend from Lake Pend d'Oreille, Idaho, which is the first preliminary to the plan of carrying water across from this lake to the semi-arid regions of middle eastern Washington, south and southwest of Lincoln county, says the Oregonian Times.

A survey was run down along the Spokane river during the summer, but that route was found impracticable, and now the survey is coming along in the direction of the Central Washington road. It is said that the object will be to carry the water along at as high an elevation as possible, so that it can be taken in any direction.

Douglas, Adams, Franklin and other eastern Washington counties where there is considerable arid land, all lie on a lower level and could be easily supplied from this canal.

Large reservoirs would be constructed and lakes formed in the depressions that were unfit for cultivation, so that a vast amount of surplus water could be stored up for use during the summer months.

The government has withdrawn several townships of arid land in the counties named, and those familiar with its plan of reclaiming the waste places, believe this project will be carried out at no distant date, and that a great deal of the water now running to waste, will be diverted to the farm lands of the country.

LABOR IS SCARCE.

Free Transportation is Offered to Men From Spokane.

Laboring men in Spokane need not lack for work, says the Spokane Press. Every employment office has its card offering free transportation to the scene of railroad construction. A canvass of the principal offices discloses the fact that every day from 25 to 50 men are shipped out of Spokane.

One manager said: "Since the harvest is over and the men have spent their earnings we find no trouble in getting all we want for railroad work. Of course it is the hardest kind, but the class we want are used to it. Domestic as a rule are scarce, especially for out of town situations, and miners are badly wanted in the Coeur d'Alenes and in British Columbia camps. Outside of these two classes we can generally supply all the help wanted."

J. H. Travers, manager of the Red Cross Employment agency, took over 25 men to Tacoma last night for rock work on the Northern Pacific. Another gang will leave this evening for Gray's harbor, and still others are ready to go into Montana. The winter season will find few idle men in the city.

BIG SALE OF BEEF CATTLE.

J. W. Howard Will Dispose of 2,500 Head This Winter to California Stock Buyers.

J. W. Howard, the Crook county cattleman who is wintering his beef cattle in Lake county this year, will feed about 2,500 head during the winter months in the vicinity of Klamath Falls, says the Crook County Journal. Mr. Howard at present has about 3,500 head rounded up and will sell his first delivery about the 20th of November. They have been sold to California buyers and will be taken from Lake county to their destination in that state. Other sales have been completed and the deliveries will be made about every 20 days until 2,500 head have been disposed of.

Mr. Howard has purchased all of the hay belonging to Ankeny & Cantrell, also that from the Henley ranch besides many other smaller lots, and is feeding at present about 40 tons a day. A large number of his cattle have been at Silver Lake, but these are being driven to the Klamath Basin. Mr. Howard expects to have most of his cattle marketed by the 1st of January.
