Portland is after the establishment of a packing house and will do all to have the independent people put one there. They are giving their moral support to the scheme of building there and when the time comes to build, will put their money in the plant. They realize the fact that the packing plant in which the stockmen of the country are interested and one behind which the stockmen will stand, will be a great thing for the city, and are willing to support such an institution and do all that they can to bring about its establishment.

The meeting in January will be one of the largest ever held in the city, and at it many matters will be discussed and perhaps decided upon that are of vital interest to the development of the Northwest.
