### GENERAL NEWS.

H. S. Canfield, a Chicago newspaper man, suicided Monday last while temporarily insane, by cutting his throat with a razor.

Failure of air brakes to work properly caused a rear-end collision on a Brooklyn elevated road, in which ten persons were more or less seriously injured.

After January 1 Canada will impose a head tax of \$500 upon every Chinaman imported. Mexico has decided upon the policy of admitting them without restriction.

It is believed that there are 500,000 miles of railroad in the world, of which the United States has 214,000 miles and other North American countries 13,000 miles.

A rifle has been invented by a Utah man, the recoil of which when it is fired, throws out the empty shell, puts another cartridge in place from the magazine and cocks the weapon.

The final schedules show that Edwin S. Hooley & Co., who failed in July on Wall street, have liabilities amounting to \$2,749,999, of which less than one-fourth is secured to creditors.

It is stated that the recent failures of national banks were not reflected in the slightest degree in Mexican financial circles, contrary to the general expectation this side of the line. The same general fact was true during the July disturbances in Wall street. Mexican securities suffered very little.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

Lawrence Johnson committed suicide Monday evening near Colfax, by drinking carbolic acid.

George Crane, a full-blooded Klamath Indian boy, deserted from the Chemawa school Tuesday, and has not yet been located.

James A. Duke, an engineer on a vineyard at Fresno, was burned to death Tuesday, by the burning of the bunkhouse on the premises.

Miss Cora Ramsey, of Grant's Pass, has sued the city marshal for \$10,000 damages for searching her for a sum of money, which she was accused of stealing.

One thousand marriage licenses were issued in Multnomah county, from January 1 to October 17, an increase of 122 over the same period last year.

Fifty-five pounds of dynamite, stored in a barn at Roseburg, was exploded in some unknown manner, Tuesday, and the barn and other out-buildings were burned.

An unknown man committed suicide by shooting himself through the head, on the outskirts of Portland, near the terminus of the Washington street car line, Tuesday.

Labor Commissioner Hoff, has just returned to Salem from a tour of inspection through Southern Oregon, and says labor conditions are excellent in that portion of the state.

Brown and Leonard, owners of the Silvertonian, of Silverton, Or., have purchased the Silverton Appeal, one of the oldest papers in Marion county, and will consolidate the two offices.

The Washington superior court has sustained the 8-hour labor law of that state, and C. N. Broad, a contractor of Spokane, on municipal work, has been arrested for working his men nine hours, thereby violating the city ordinance.

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### SAVING DIVERTED WATER.

By Improved Methods of Ditch Making 80 Per Cent of the Water is Saved.

One of the most important features of irrigation in this section is the construction of ditches which will carry water through the sandy soil without waste in seepage. In the ordinary water ditch, according to the experiments of the state of Utah, about 30 per cent of the water diverted is wasted in seepage and failure of the soil to carry the supply.

Every imaginable kind of ditch has been made with a view to saving this waste water and applying it to the soil. In that state the soil is gravel and the waste is very great. In the sandy districts various kinds of ditch making has been tried. Puddling with clay, mud in the bottom of the ditch, iron pipe, wooden flumes and all such improved methods of construction have been tried with varying degrees of success. New models of water measuring devices, weirs, headgates and dams have been introduced in Utah. It has been found that by using the canvas dam, in small ditches, and the concrete weir, in large ditches, about 80 per cent of the water diverted can be delivered onto the ground.

### SHEEPHERD GONE WRONG.

William Pollard Now in Canyon City Jail for Horse Stealing.

William Pollard, who was taken in irons to Canyon City yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Donaldson, lies under a more serious charge than that of obtaining money under false pretenses, which was the original cause of his arrest, says the Baker City Herald. He is charged with horse stealing.

Pollard has been employed as a herder by various shepherms near Prairie City, and it is claimed went into town at various times and ran up accounts with the merchants in his employers' names.

He and a partner named George Williams went to the livery stable of Donaldson Brothers and procured a horse which they raffled off. The proceeds they pocketed and skipped out. A warrant was issued for their arrest and H. E. Donaldson, a son of Deputy Sheriff Donaldson, succeeded in locating Pollard here. Williams has not been apprehended.

### MARKET DEMORALIZED.

Prune Sales in Willamette Valley Very Unsatisfactory.

Salem, Oct. 21.—The fruit market in the Willamette valley at present is in a very demoralized condition, very much the same as the hop market, and, according to the dealers themselves—who do not hesitate to pick up everything that comes along on speculation and otherwise—it is all due to the growers, who persist in flocking into the city and forcing their crop upon a market that is in a weak and unsettled condition and taking any thing that is offered them, without stopping to consider the effect of the supply and the inevitable forthcoming demand.

In the early part of the season the Willamette Valley Prune Association adopted a scale of a 2 1/2 cent basis upon four sizes, meaning 4 1/2 cents for 40-50s, and no trouble was realized in procuring it, but they soon began to cut prices and now things are different.

### WANT NO JOBS.

Teachers for the Philippine Service Fail to Appear.

Yesterday was the first day of the civil service examinations for the position of law clerk and Philippine school teacher, says the Walla Walla Union. The examination is held before the local board of examiners of which A. T. Bedell is chairman and presiding examiner. For Philippine teacher but one applicant, Harry Tash, appeared. He will finish his examination today. Mr. Tash is a graduate of Whitman College, and has already spent two years teaching the Filipino youth, having been sent with the first installment of teachers after the pacification of the islands.

No applicant appeared for the law clerk examination.

## LICENSES TO SOAR

### SPOKANE THEATERS TO MAKE SALOONS PAY \$1,000.

Council Says Liquor Dealers are Getting off too Easy—Some Interior Towns Charge \$1,200 per Year License—Business is Improving, License Should Soar.

Spokane, Oct. 21.—Councilman Burch of the Fourth ward has prepared an ordinance that will be introduced at the meeting of the city council tomorrow night to increase the yearly saloon license from \$500 to \$1,000.

Inasmuch as there are over 130 saloons in the city the increased revenue to the city, if the ordinance passes will amount to approximately \$70,000 a year.

Persons acquainted with the plan for the new ordinance say it the outcome of long deliberation among the city officials as to a means for aiding the finances of the city during the coming year. It was agreed that this is one of the best methods that could be devised and that heretofore the license fee in Spokane has been entirely too small.

In support of the claim that Spokane saloons are not paying enough for the privilege to do business it is pointed out by the officials that Seattle now has a \$1,000 license, and that the number of saloons in the city has not decreased any since the heavier license has been collected. The same conditions prevail in Minneapolis. In some of the smaller cities in this state it is said the license is \$1,200 per year. As far as known, the present cost of a license, the high license advocates claim, in Spokane, is the lowest in any city in the state.

For some weeks the feeling has been growing among the city councilmen that the license rate was too small and city hall office holders expressed the belief this afternoon that the new ordinance will pass the council.
