Question of Who Inherits Land on the Reservation.

A suit was filed in the clerk's office this morning by Halley & Lowell in the case of Irving Johnson vs. Maggie LaBrush. The case is an action to determine the possession of a quarter section of land on the Umatilla reservation.

The plaintiff alleges that he married the sister of the defendant in 1893, and that she afterwards died intestate, leaving him the sole heir to the land allotted her by the government. The defendant claims a share in the land and its products, and rentals, and this the plaintiff objects to.

For Echo Cannery.

T. C. Taylor received an order for a heavy seasoning vat, this morning for the Echo cannery company. The vat will be 36 inches long, 24 inches wide and 12 inches deep, and is being made of copper today. It will be used in seasoning the cooked meat before it is sealed in the cans. The engine and all the necessary piping has been secured and will be placed in position immediately, and the company is expected to be in operation within a few days, depending on the recovery of H. C. Willis, who has been very sick for some time.
