Carnegie's prophecy that in time England, Canada and the United States would all comprise one great nation of English-speaking people, under one government, seems far from being realized, in view of the hostile attitude of the Canadians toward the Alaskan boundary settlement. But such a little family row as that would soon blow over.

To show how deeply the railroads are interested in the reclamation of the desert, it is only necessary to quote about 10 words from an irrigation speech by James J. Hill at Bismarck, N. D. He said: "Before you can get traffic, you must make it." That sentence is the biggest book written in the 20th century. That is Hill's creed. It sounds just like him.

Today in Salem, the editors are eating "yaller" legged chicken and telling each other how to run a newspaper. Tomorrow they will be looking silly at the frazzled-out remnant left in their mileage books and sharpening their wits to study a scheme to get more subscribers, cut down expenses and say nice things to be copied by contemporaries. Talk about a strenuous life. The White House isn't in it.

Judging from an outside point of view, it seems that the Lewis and Clark corporation has done an un-gallant act in not making the "Exposition," a worthy monthly journal published in the interest of the fair by Edith Torgler Weathered, the official journal of the fair. With the financial backing of the corporation, the "Exposition" could be made a strong publication and its editor deserves all the honor that Oregon has to bestow.

The East Oregonian does not rejoice in bad news or misfortunes which injure anyone, morally or financially, although the story may be thrilling. It would rather deny its readers a sensation than to publish something which reflects on the character or purposes of any citizen, although the sensation may be true. It is the province of the press to give the news, but it is not the province of the press to jump at conclusions and cast insinuations which may be injurious. Independent and fearless, this paper will tell the news as it is, but it hesitates to surmise, to the injury of any citizen.

A handful of school girls, ranging in age from 12 to 15, are in the habit of congregating on the railway platform when the trains come, for the innocent purpose of cultivating a flirtation with the pennant "butcher." This is a girlish instinct. Many a good mother has done it herself, when at the flirting period, but it isn't right, girls. You consume the time of the peanut man, which he should devote to selling his wares and hunting other suckers. Go home and roll up your sleeves. It is safe to say that any mother who will allow a girl of your age to "gad" around looking for a "fellow," always has a pan of dirty dishes covered up with a dirty tablecloth, waiting to be washed. You can't flirt and gad and learn your lessons. Go back to the diaphan. It is a homely instrument, but it is a useful one and hades is full of girls who have shunned it.

### COMMITTEES NOT DISCHARGED.

Because the program for the irrigation convention is decided upon, the committees must not stop work.

Each individual member of each committee should write personal letters to different parts of the state, urging attendance. This meeting is in the hands of Pendleton's citizens. The success of the convention depends upon their activity.

Every visitor and delegate should go away pleased and satisfied. There should be something done, some special energetic spirit exhibited, some individual activity manifested which will cause the visitors to remember Pendleton with pleasure.

Conventions are held when there is some special attraction. No matter how homely the subject, there is enjoyment to be extracted from it. If this subject of irrigation is adorned in its romantic phases, shown up in its specially interesting lights, two days of pleasure can be promised the delegates.

Who is the oldest irrigator in Umatilla county? Search him out and have him on the ground. Decorate the hall with sage brush, the symbol of the desert and with fruits and flowers, the symbols of civilization and plenty. Make the meeting a conference of specialists. Tell how to make ditches correctly, how to apply water to your various soils.

Begin with the desert and fight the battle of reclamation through all its stages, to the smiling orchard. It is an entrancing story. Strangers will listen with rapture to its recital. Those familiar with the process never tire of its thrilling interest.

The season is too late to get a very wide variety of fruits, but it is not the result but the spirit that will count. Pendleton will do the best she can do. No one can do more.

The first and last duty of everybody in Pendleton until that meeting convenes, is to write letters. One private letter, telling of the meeting and inviting a friend to come, will accomplish something. Everybody is a committee of one—and each woman is a committee of two, for their enthusiasm always counts for two—to make this meeting successful.

Haul in tons of sage brush and decorate the city and especially the meeting place. Get the spirit. Be enthused. Irrigation is coming our way. Let us boom it.


