TOURING THE WORLD.

A. K. Prince, Genial Globe Trotter, is in the City Today.

Wearing badges of the orders of Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Elks, and Eagles, and enjoying the distinction of having attained to the 32d degree in Masonry, Albert K. Prince, a genial globe trotter, arrived in the city last evening and is in the hands of his friends today.

Prince is on a rather remarkable mission, and is filling his mission full of enjoyment. At this time Prince has visited 38 states and 850 cities of over 5,000 population in the United States and Canada. Mr. Prince will give an entertainment in the lobby of Hotel Pendleton this evening at 7:30, and possibly will entertain his brother Elks with a private party later.

They leave in the morning for La Grande and Baker City and after visiting these points will go to Boise, and on through Montana. Mr. Prince plays the mandolin and whistle, and is an entertaining conversationalist. His mission is one of curiosity and sightseeing, and he is making the most of it. He believes that no tourist is qualified to visit a foreign country until he becomes perfectly familiar with his own, and to this end he is preparing himself for an European tour, after he sees in the United States.
