ALASKAN TRAFFIC

OVER 5,000 PEOPLE
TO THE FAR NORTH.

Freight Traffic This Year Amounted to Over 110,000 Tons—Rates on Freight Ranged From \$4 to \$22 Per Ton.

Five thousand five hundred and fifty-three people were dispatched and 110,750 tons of freight, valued at \$11,075,000, were shipped from Seattle to Nome and the lower Yukon districts during the season of 1903, says the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

As regards the movement of both freight and passengers to Nome the season closed October 12 with the departure of the steamship Oregon, the last vessel to leave any port for the famous gold fields. While the volume of business in the memorable rush of 1900 was larger, this has been one of the most profitable seasons in the history of the district, as the figures will show when the last vessel returns from Nome.

Freight rates ranged all the way from \$7 to \$22.50 per ton. As a rule the latter figure was obtained on lumber and double compressed hay. Rates on coal dropped to a very low figure, some having been delivered on the beach at Nome for \$10 or lower.

The following gives the number of passengers, amount of cargo, value of freight, etc., shipped to Nome from Seattle during the season just closed:

Number of passengers embarking at Seattle for Nome, 5,553; number of tons of freight shipped from Seattle to Nome and lower Yukon, 110,750; value of freight shipped from Seattle to Nome, \$11,075,000; passage money paid the transportation companies, \$277,650; freight charges paid, \$1,661,250; average freight rate, per ton, \$15; average passage rate, \$50; number of sailings, 67; number of vessels in the Nome trade, 38.

BOARDS OF HEALTH.

State and Provincial in Session at Baltimore, Oct. 23.—The annual conference of State and Provincial Boards of Health of North America began in Baltimore today with an attendance of several score of health officials of this country and Canada. The meeting is in the nature of a preliminary to the annual convention of the American Public Health Association, to be held in Washington during the coming week.

Dr. Irving A. Watson, of New Hampshire, presided at the opening of the conference today. The proceedings consisted of the reading and discussion of papers dealing with sanitation, the prevention of tuberculosis and its treatment, water supply and various other questions having to do with the public health. The conference will continue and conclude its business tomorrow.

BULGARIAN EXHIBIT.

First Representation at Any American Fair.

St. Louis, Oct. 23.—The directors of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition are in receipt of a letter from Commissioner Cridler, stating that Bulgaria is disposed to take part in the exposition, and that he expects to visit Sofia soon and personally see Prince Ferdinand in regard to the matter.

Should Bulgaria accept the invitation it will be the first time she has been represented by an exhibit at any international exposition held in America.

SQUEALS ON THE MOB.

Wyoming Man Gives Names of 35 Citizens Wanted by Officials.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 23.—A Cody, Wyo., dispatch says W. H. Smith, in custody at Basin, Wyo., has confessed to complicity in mobbing the jail at Basin last July, when Gorman and Walters, two murderers, were shot by the mob. Deputy Sheriff Price killed and Deputy Meade wounded.

Smith gives the names of 35 other men in the mob. The grand jury called by the governor of Wyoming, will meet at Basin this afternoon. It is feared an attempt will be made to kill Smith.

NEW DINING CAR SERVICE.

Elegant Equipment for the O. R. & N. is Now in Portland, and Will Be in Use Soon.

Three elegant dining cars, to be attached to O. R. & N. trains, Numbers 5 and 6, are now in Portland awaiting for final arrangements to be made before placing in service on the main line between Portland and Huntington.

These cars represent an outlay of about \$100,000, exclusive of their equipment, which is to be new and of the most elegant designs in use on any system. The crews for these cars have been employed for some time awaiting the arrival of the cars from the factory.

The exact date for the beginning of the new service has not yet been announced by the company, but as the cars are now ready for service, it is only a matter of a few days.

The installation of this service will do away with the stop for meals at La Grande and Huntington, and will shorten the time between Portland and Ogden about one hour, besides furnishing patrons a first-class service on all trains on the main line of the O. R. & N.

The diners on Numbers 1 and 2 will be held over at La Grande, as at present. No. 2 east-bound, will set it out there in the evening, after dinner is served, and No. 1 will pick it up the next morning in time to serve breakfast. It has not yet been announced how the diners will be handled on the new run, but owing to the irregularity of the eastern connections of the O. R. & N., it is possible that the diners will be hauled with the trains over the entire system, to make sure of having them when meal time arrives.
