GENERAL NEWS.

The American-France extradition treaty is being amended to include extradition for bribery.

Mrs. Louie Iverson, of Pacific Grove, Cal., while insane from religious unbalance, killed her three small children Saturday last.

All incoming steamers are being watched for thieves who stole \$100,000 worth of jewelry from Knight, Frank & Rutley, of London, October 18.

Henry Waischeid, of Chicago, yesterday shot and killed his stepfather, Nicholas Rolle, as the latter was in the act of striking the boy's mother with an iron bar.

E. A. Sorrells and Samuel Flynn, attendants in Bartonville, Ill., insane asylum, are accused of beating a patient to death. Ball has been required of each in the sum of \$10,000.

Dr. L. D. Rood, of Des Moines, Ia., Sunday last accidentally inoculated himself with anti-tetanic serum. He has calmly announced that he expects to die some time next week, and is arranging his affairs to that end.

Rev. A. E. Gammaze, pastor of the Lawn Avenue Baptist church, Kansas City, has been dismissed because he believes and preaches divine healing. He will establish an independent Baptist church, as many of his parishioners will stay by him.

Strenuous but more or less spasmodic efforts to secure Sunday closing of saloons in New York City are being made. Six men and nine women were yesterday sentenced to six months in the city jail for being found in a saloon the day before.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Oregon Good Roads Association will hold the next annual meeting at Salem, in October, 1904.

The fear of famine in the Tanana mining district of Alaska, has driven most of the miners out of that section of the north, for the winter.

Ella Davis, of Butte, committed suicide Monday on account of the shut-down of the mines, which forced her lover to go away to seek work elsewhere.

A would-be assassin fired through the window of the residence of Antonio Parrelle, of Portland, Monday morning, but missed his mark. The family was seated at the breakfast table at the time.

The vault of the courthouse at Baker City was burglarized Monday, and \$10 in stamps and change taken. There is no clue to the robber. It is thought to be the work of someone having duplicate keys.

Fifteen business men and miners of Sumpter have contributed \$2,000 each toward building an electric road between Sumpter and Bourne, a distance of seven miles through a steep mountain canyon.

N. McBride, of Portland, who was ordered to stop by a thug, Sunday night, refused to obey and was stabbed in the arm with a dirk. His cries brought a policeman to the scene and the robber escaped.

George Fry, 9 years old, of Iiwaco, is a condemned housebreaker, having been caught robbing neighbors' houses on several occasions. He is thought to be a kleptomaniac and his case will be attended to by the reform school.
