FAIR SUCCESS.

Walla Walla County Cleans Up Over
\$4,000 First Year.
Between \$4,000 and \$5,000 will be
the net clean-up for the Walla Walla
County Fair Association as a result
of the first annual race meet and fair.
The exact figures, Secretary Caswell
and Treasurer Guichard said this
morning, could not be ascertained
until the books of the association were
posted and expeted, but both
advanced the opinion that the sum
realized will be between the sums
stated. That the officers of the as-
sociation are highly pleased with the
success of the first meet and fair is
expressing it mildly.
"Of course what we made this year
is not all profit, by any means, as
it will take much of this sum to take
up the indebtedness contracted in
erecting the buildings and grand
stand," Secretary Caswell said this
morning to the Walla Walla States-
man. "We expect, however, to clear
up all the indebtedness and have a
nice little surplus left over for next
year to erect a large pavilion and
make other improvements on the
grounds that are absolutely neces-
sary."

The dogs are getting to be a pest and are said to be dangerous. A party will be organized to hunt them down.

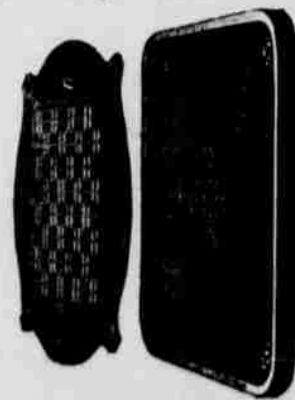
