How to Sell a Crop and Still Have it.

A great many farmers carry their crops for a long time after harvest waiting for an advance in prices. Those who used money can get a large part of the value of their crop out in money and still hold the grain for an advance in the following manner:

Suppose a farmer has 5,000 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 65 cents a bushel; let him sell it and receive \$3,250 in payment; then let him buy 5,000 bushels of May wheat and margin it 5 cents a bushel. This will require \$320.00. He will then have \$2,930 to use as he sees fit. If the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel, he will make \$250 the same as if he had held his 5,000 bushels of wheat in his granary.

PENDLETON RETAIL MARKETS

Quotations on Staples Furnished by Local Merchants and Revised Daily.

The local hide market has gotten big enough to get into print, and from this time on will be one of the regular features of the market list. While it is not booming to the extent that it will be, it is on the road. The dealers have put out their wagons over the country and are bringing in load after load each week. The prices have not changed to any great extent, and are pretty stationary, but the indications are that they will be higher in a short time.

The general tone of the market in the grocery line all through is stronger than it has been for some time. The prices for staples have risen in the Eastern quotations, but the wave has not as yet reached this part of the country. However, the change is felt in among the dealers, and will be of effect in a short time unless there is a change.

Canned goods, especially corn and tomatoes, are scarce and hard to get. The price on them has not risen, but the scarcity is felt by the grocers.

Hothouse lettuce is in the market at 5 cents a bunch, and sauer kraut, the joy of the German's heart, has come into the stalls for a lengthy visit. It can be bought by the quart for 10 cents, or by the gallon for 40 cents, according to the capacity and desire of the purchaser.

Turkeys will be here this week also, and will range in price from \$1 to \$2 each, according to size and condition. Otherwise there is no change and the quotations are the same.
