JURORS DRAWN.

Panel of Fifty Summoned for the November Term of United States District Court.

Out of a panel of 50 jurors drawn for the November term of the United States district court, to convene in Portland on November 16, but two men from Umatilla county were named—E. L. Barnett, banker, of Athena, and R. H. Graves, stockman, of Gibbon.

This jury will be called upon to pass judgment on the cases of Marie L. Ware, Horace G. McKinley and S. D. Pater, indicted yesterday by the federal grand jury for forgery, in making "dummy" filings in the United States land commissioner's office, at Eugene, and also on the guilt of Asa B. Thompson, indicted on three counts, for misconduct, as receiver of the La Grande land office.

Walla Walla Convicts.

A total of 648 convicts are now at the Walla Walla penitentiary, the number being increased eighteen by the arrival of that many from King, Lincoln, Okanogan and Snohomish counties. Sixteen guards and sheriffs insured the safe arrival of the prisoners. Among the convicts is a woman, Edna Forrest, from King county, who will serve one year for grand larceny.

COUNCIL MEETING

VERY INTERESTING BUSINESS SESSION.

Salary List Allowed—Deed to New Park Grounds Has Been Made Out—Ordinance Will Be Drawn Establishing Width of Cement Sidewalks—Mill Race Will Be Bridged—Ann Street is Nearly All Sidewalked.

The meeting of the city council last evening was brief, businesslike and to the point. The councilmen all had irrigation or something on their minds and wanted to get away from the rooms and worked accordingly.

The chief thing of importance was the salary list for the month, which was allowed as presented by the recorder. Liquor licenses were issued to Tex Langvler, H. A. Kline and John Schmidt.

Warrants were ordered drawn to pay freight on a consignment of casings for the sewer, which had come over the O. R. & N.

Deed is Made Out.

Councilman Hartman reported that the deeds to the lots bought by the city for park purposes had been made out but not recorded, and asked for \$52 with which to pay for that requirement of the law. The warrants were ordered drawn.

It was stated that Dr. C. J. Smith and others wanted to construct cement sidewalks around their properties, and did not wish to make them as wide as the ordinance in effect required. It was suggested by the council that an ordinance be drawn allowing the sidewalks in the residence district to be from four to six feet wide with a terrace and curb. The ordinance will be drawn by the city attorney at his earliest convenience.

Will Bridge the Race.

The street commissioner asked permission to throw a bridge across the mill race near the Sisters' school, where the sidewalk passed on the north side of Court street. The permission was given and the bridge will be put diagonally across the race on a line with the sidewalk. This will make it about 75 feet long and it will be trussed over the middle of the stream.

Howard reported that all of Ann street had been sidewalked with the exception of a stretch of 100 feet on one side of the street and 50 feet on the other, and he asked that the property owners be asked to put in walks where they had neglected so to do, under penalty of having the city do it for them. The commissioner was directed to so notify the persons owning the property where there was no walk.

TRACK AND ANNUAL RACES.

Both Are Needed by Pendleton and Umatilla County.

James Irwin, the horseman, has returned from a summer's trip on the Northwest circuit, where he has had his string of horses on the track. He has had good luck during the season and comes home well pleased with the work of his stock. He had with him Ovilla, Ollie M., Bonner, N. B. and David Harum, all of which made good records for themselves.

In a short time Mr. Irwin will leave with his stock for Walla Walla, where he will keep them for the winter. There is talk of selling the local track, and Mr. Irwin wishes to have a permanent place where he can keep his horses in condition for next season.

The lack of interest on the part of the people of Pendleton in regard to the horses here and the possibilities of a track here, is driving the owners from this place to locations where they can have conveniences for handling their stock.

In the estimation of a great many of the stockmen and business men, it would be a good thing for the interests of the city to have a track here and hold annual races. In connection, a county fair could be held.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Finch Gets Damages and Costs—Jurors Excused Till November.

The jury in the case of Finch vs. Stockman, which took up the attention of the circuit court yesterday, brought in a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$550 and costs of the action. The plaintiff had asked for \$3,200. This is the suit caused by the assault of Stockman on the plaintiff several months ago, in which Finch was knocked insensible with a large club. At the preliminary trial the defendant pleaded guilty and paid a fine of \$50 and costs.

Judge Ellis yesterday excused the jurors from further attendance on the court until the morning of November 11, when there will be a few more jury trials to come before the court. The men had been in continuous attendance on the court for three weeks, and it was with some difficulty that the court could keep them together. For this reason he adjourned court for a recess as far as the jury trials are concerned.

There are yet several cases in equity to be heard by the court, and they will occupy the time until the other cases are up for trial.

Will Peterson in Town.

Will Peterson, the attorney of Athena, was in the city today for a short visit. Mr. Peterson has just returned from a visit to Lewiston, where he had an important case before the court. At the conclusion of the session there he went to Boise and Spokane for an extended trip. He was here on business before the circuit court.

Yesterday afternoon a Jap workman for the O. R. & N. at Umatilla, while out after rabbits, shot himself through the foot with a 22 rifle. He was brought to this city and Dr. E. W. Vincent, the company physician, dressed the wound. The man returned to Umatilla on the morning train.
