A NEW IDAHO ROAD

ELECTRIC LINE FROM
LEWISTON TO GRANGEVILLE.

Articles of Incorporation Filed—Cap-
ital Placed at \$4,000,000—Length of
Line About 80 Miles, Through a
Rich Farming Country.

Judson Spofford whose organiza-
tion of a \$4,000,000 corporation for
the construction and operation of an
electric trolley line about 100 miles
from Lewiston to the Camas prairie
section has been noted in the tele-
graphic columns of this paper, is in
Boise on a brief business trip to
close up some details connected with
his company and attend to some private
business affairs, says the Boise
Statesman.

Mr. Spofford yesterday filed the
articles of incorporation of the new
company, which is known as the
Lewiston & Southwestern Electric
Railway company, and shortly there-
after his other business matters being
in a satisfactory condition, wired
the engineer of the proposed line to
proceed with the surveys.

The proposed line, according to
Mr. Spofford, is expected to cost in
the neighborhood of \$2,000,000 for
its construction, including the power
and equipment. The line will be
about 100 miles in length.

From Lewiston the road will run
to Craig mountain, where it will
fork, one line running from the foot
of the mountain through Denver and
Cottonwood to Grangeville, and the
other almost due east through Ilo
and Dublin to Nez Perce City.

The Lewiston-Grangeville line will
be about 80 miles in length, while the
Nez Perce line, from the junction
point, will be about 20 miles long.

The engineering features of the
plan are not difficult. The prelimi-
nary surveys demonstrate the fact,
says Mr. Spofford, that there will be
nothing heavier than a three per cent
grade the entire distance, which is
considered low for an electric line,
although it would be quite steep for a
steam road. Some deviation from a
direct route will be necessary in
ascending Craig mountain.

POST OFFICE STOLEN.

Shoshone the Scene of a Midnight
Raid and Consequent Wrath.

The following account of the theft
of the Shoshone postoffice, from the
Shoshone Independent, reminds old-
timers of the thefts of county seats
in Union and Umatilla counties, be-
tween two suns, many years ago.

The Independent says: "Our read-
ers will doubtless remember that a
few weeks ago there was some talk
of changing the location of the post-
office. This movement was opposed
by nine-tenths of our merchants for
many good and substantial reasons,
one of the main objections being that
the proposed location was so far away
from the business center of the city.

"This protest took form and was
sent to Washington. But the individ-
uals on the corner, evidently
knowing that an action opposed so
strongly would not be met with favor
by the postoffice authorities, but it
seems that they did approve, so they
proceeded Tuesday night to move it
to other quarters, consequently many
protests, were heard Wednesday
morning, when the citizens of our
town went to get their mail and found
that during the night the postoffice
had been removed. Upon inquiry it
was found that it was located in the
Gooding block.

"Of course it is all right, we are
not kicking, we recognize the fact
and it is time that every citizen and
taxpayer of the village and in fact
the whole country should do the
same, that if the "Boss" wants any-
thing, why, he must have it. No
matter whether the taxpayers agree
or not. Why, they are not even to

NEW YORK POLITICS

CONCENTRATED AND
TREMENDOUS EFFORT.

Democrats Have Centered on Re-
publican Strongholds and Vice
Versa—Great Surprises Expected—
Campaign Will be a Noted One in
History.

New York, Oct. 29.—With election
but four days away both parties in
the struggle for the control of the
government of Greater New York
have taken off their coats and other-
wise prepared themselves to make a
whirlwind finish to one of the fiercest
contests in the political history of the
city.

So intense is the struggle and so
deeply interested is the public in the
result that even the invasion of Dowle
and his band of 3,500 followers failed
to divert attention from the cam-
paign. Throughout the last ten days
the motley crowds at the political ral-
lies in Carnegie Hall, Cooper Union,
Tammany Hall and other meeting
places have rivaled in size those that
filled Madison Square Garden to sat-
isfy their curiosity by seeing the
self-appointed "Elijah II." The Tam-
many cohorts have centered much of
their effort on the Republican strong-
hold of Brooklyn, while the fusion-
ists, on the other hand, have been
whooping it up on the Lower East
Side and in other downtown sec-
tions where Tammany Hall has ruled
the roost for years.

It is believed that when the bal-
lots are counted the results will con-
tain many surprises as tending to
show that the political lines are
changing about. Districts heretofore
strongly democratic are expected to
show big gains for the fusionists,
while in other districts the reverse
may be true.

Whether Low or McClellan be-
come the next mayor the campaign
is certain to go down in history as
one of the hottest the metropolis has
ever known. With every assembly
hall and other place of public meet-
ing filled nightly both parties have
resorted to the holding of overflow
meetings.

All along Broadway for miles, and
in Eighth avenue, Ninth avenue and
other leading thoroughfares tons of
red fire are burned every night,
while the typical political orators of
the street corner pour forth their
arguments in favor of their respec-
tive leaders and their denunciations
of the opposing candidates, while the
crowds are entertained in the inter-
vals between the speeches with band
music, vaudeville turns and exhibi-
tions of sleight-of-hand.
