PENDLETON RETAIL MARKETS

Quotations on Staples Furnished by Local Merchants and Revised Daily.

Perhaps never before in Pendleton have the hothouse vegetables been in such demand at this time of year nor in such fine quality. The radishes, spinach, lettuce and other summer luxuries now in the markets are very good, and have less of the hothouse appearance than ordinary. Country butter is scarce and eggs are still around the 35 cent mark, although the supply is increasing slowly. Dry onions are a scarce article, and a good quality of turnips seems difficult to find, most of those on the market being very large, and consequently hollow, or pithy. Apples are ruling strong at 75 cents and \$1 per box, and the quality is good. There will be an increase in the price within a week, if the shipments for winter use do not live up somewhat.

RAIN IS WELCOME.

Walla Walla Farmers Rejoice to See Dry Weather Broken.
Farmers of the Walla Walla valley viewed with no little satisfaction the gentle downpour of rain last night and today, as it is the first rain to occur since the 11th of the month, and the year's deficiency has been crawling up at the startling rate of .05 of an inch a day, says the Walla Walla Statesman.
The weather for the past three weeks has been ideal in its balminess, but farmers who sowed their wheat early in the month, and those who wished to get at this important farm work before freezing weather, would have liked a few gentle showers of today's nature sandwiched in.
The total precipitation for the month has been but 1.27 inches and the year's deficiency has amounted to 2.21 inches, a condition which not overcome this winter, may result in shortened crops if next year's deficiency equals that of the past season, which was something unusual for Southwestern Washington.
Less than 20 per cent of the acreage of the Eureka flat, Prescott belt has been seeded down owing to the lack of rainfall, and three weeks will be consumed in getting in next year's crops even with favorable weather.
Farmers of the foothill district have fared much better than those farming the lighter lands, and with few exceptions seeding has been finished in this district.

How to Sell a Crop and Still Have It.

A great many farmers carry their crops for a long time after harvest waiting for an advance in prices. Those who need money can get a large part of the value of their crop out in money and still hold the grain for an advance in the following manner.
Suppose a farmer has 5,000 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 65 cents a bushel; let him sell it and receive \$3,250 in payment; then let him buy 5,000 bushels of May wheat and margin it 5 cents a bushel. This will require \$350.00. He will then have \$2,900 to use as he sees fit. If the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel, he will make \$250 the same as if he had held his 5,000 bushels of wheat in his granary.
