### FOUR SHOWER BATHS.

Other Additions to High School Gymnasium Equipment.

Four shower baths have been placed in the gymnasium at the high school, and while not connected at this time, will be in working order by Saturday. For a long time the students have been wishing for something of this kind, as they had no convenient way of cleaning up after a football game or a time spent in the gymnasium.

They have had a home-made bath constructed by the pupils themselves, but its capacity was limited and the water had to be carried by hand and poured into the tank. With the new baths all of the football teams will be able to have their baths without long waits or trouble.

New apparatus is being added to the gymnasium constantly, until in a short time its equipment will be complete enough to meet the requirements of all of the work. There are two classes a week now carried on in the gymnasium, which gives all of the pupils a chance to get physical training.

This work is under the charge of Roy Conklin, who gives to the pupils a thorough and systematic course of training. Besides this the gymnasium is open to the pupils after the school hours, and at this time they can play handball, basket-ball, or use the apparatus. The department is proving of great interest to the pupils, as well as of benefit.

### GENERAL NEWS.

P. J. Sexton, the well-known Chicago contractor, died yesterday, aged 57.

Two Italian miners fell 1,000 feet in the Minnie Healy mine at Butte, and were killed.

Faustino Millerino, a Filipino guerrilla, who led the recent uprising in Rizal, has been court-martialed and sentenced to death.

Lieutenant J. W. Walsh, in the Philippines, has been sentenced to 10 years imprisonment for embezzling \$13,000 government funds.

Henry E. Highton, of Honolulu, is a candidate for the United States district judgeship of Hawaii, made vacant by the death of M. M. Estee.

In a collision off Hakodate, Japan, between the Japanese ship Toki-Maru and a Russian ship the former was sunk and 44 of her passengers and crew drowned.

The capital of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad has been increased from \$44,000,000 to \$50,000,000, to enable it to purchase the Crystal River railway, a local Colorado line.

The conviction is deepening that the government owned gold mines of Siberia are yielding immensely. They are worked secretly by long-term convicts and "lifters." Their product is cached in the imperial treasury.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

Charles Scott, janitor of the Lindelle block, Spokane, fell five stories Thursday evening and was instantly killed.

N. S. Sellen, an inmate of the Washington insane asylum at Medical Lake, committed suicide Thursday by hanging.

The proposition to build a pulp and paper mill, at Aberdeen, is now taking shape. Ground for the buildings has been secured.

Five sailors deserted from the British ship Port Patrick, now in Portland, because, they allege, the mate threatened their lives.

Ezra L. Stanford, of Waterford, Wash., is now on trial for killing Mrs. Catherine Northrup, near Heartline, on the evening of July 28.

Charles Eckstein, a Nome miner, was robbed of about \$500 and some valuable jewelry in the Portland tenderloin Thursday morning.

Five more townships are to be added to the Olympia forest reserve, on the west side of the Olympian mountains, in Washington.

Dr. J. S. Parsons, of Ashland, Or., is lying at the point of death, his illness being caused by ptomaine poisoning from canned roast beef, eaten Thursday evening.

C. E. Anthony, who was reported to have been burned to death in the first Aberdeen fire, has made his appearance at his home in Portland. He lost all his clothing and valuables in the fire, but escaped with his life.

Mrs. Bonita Goldman, wife of Fred M. Goldman, died of a broken heart in Seattle, Thursday. She was a daughter of a prominent Cuban family and married Goldman some time ago in San Francisco, believing him to be a prominent American. He was arrested on arrival at Seattle, on a charge of passing a bogus check.
