FOR ANIMAL PROTECTION.

Persons Who Permit Stock to Suffer to be Prosecuted. The state board of child and animal protection of Colorado has issued the following statement: "In view of the suffering of range stock last winter in the state, it becomes the duty of this board to call the attention of stock men to the law forbidding the neglect or abuse of dumb animals, and to notify them that complaints made the coming winter of stock suffering for want of food, water or shelter, if found to be true, will be prosecuted. This notice is issued at this time in order that due provision may be made before winter for the proper care of stock by such persons as would not otherwise make provision, and so the claim cannot be made that notice was not given of the intention of the board. While it is undoubtedly true that the majority of stockmen make what is considered adequate provision for their stock it is equally true that many face the winter with the full knowledge that many of their cattle will perish of hunger, thirst and cold, and the rest will suffer all the torment of such a death without its relief. They overstock the range, sell their hay in the fall instead of keeping it to feed, keep their stock on the range without feed or water as long as they can stagger about and until after the weaker ones begin to get down, feed and water only enough to keep life in them, do not employ enough riders, do not feed or shelter in storms, do not give old stock, young stock or weak ones extra care, and put them out on the range too early in the spring, and in short, neglect their stock in all the ways heartlessness and poor business management suggest, but which the law forbids.
