GENERAL NEWS.

Thomas Cleary, a one-time famous middleweight pugilist, was accidentally smothered by the fumes from a charcoal stove at Newberg, N. Y.

The widow of Vice-President Thomas A. Hendricks died of paralysis in Indianapolis Monday last, aged 80. She was married to Mr. Hendricks in 1845.

Father P. J. Lynch for many years vicar-general of Florida, has perfected arrangements to colonize 500 families of poor Irish people on Florida lands.

Nearly all the bank failures of the past three months have been of national banks. An exception was the failure Wednesday of the Sheldon State Bank, of Sheldon, Iowa.

Tuesday night a wake was being held in New York City over the supposed corpse of John Siebert, supposed to be drowned when he walked Siebert. The corpse has not been identified.

Nine of the 14 convicts who escaped last July from the Folsom, Cal., prison, are still at large. Another outbreak has just been prevented by the quick wit of a guard and energetic measures by the warden.

An unknown man with no apparent motive, rode up to the Ames home, near Stroud, Ok., and shot and killed Mrs. Ames and the hired man, Henry Jackson, and mortally wounded Miss Ames. The assassin escaped.

The first number of the Mirror, the London paper owned, run and edited exclusively by women, scored a great "heat" on all other London papers by publishing the news that the national defenses are to be completely reorganized.

Owing to a precinct boundary line tangle in New York City, Joseph Thomas had no place to vote. He insisted on his rights, and a full complement of supplies and officers was appropriated for his benefit. His one vote cost the city \$300.

Three of the heavy coal companies of Pennsylvania are paying no attention to the decision of a mutually chosen arbitration commission which refused to recognize all their contentions. Their obduracy will probably be the cause of another strike.

Dr. E. C. Angell, of New York City, aged 81 years, dropped dead just before stepping into an election booth Tuesday. A moment before he stated that he was about to vote the first ballot he had scratched in 50 years. He had always voted a straight republican ticket.

A curious combination of seismic and electrical forces prevailed during an earthquake at sea recently off the coast of Japan. The sea was ruffled by a vertical motion for many miles, and all the watches on all the ships within the disturbed area, stopped at the same moment.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The citizens of St. Helens voted down a five-mill road tax Wednesday.

The infant child of Mr. and Mrs. George Baird, of Newberg, was scalded to death by falling into a wash-tub, Wednesday.

The Catholics cleared \$18,000 on a 40-day fair, held in Seattle, for the purpose of raising funds for the new \$250,000 church building.

GOVERNOR'S VISIT

NOT SATISFIED WITH HIS TRIP TO WASHINGTON.

Thinks the Government Should Permit Purchasers of Lieu Land to Locate Somewhere—Forest Reserve Policy is Detrimental, He Thinks.

Speaking of his trip to Washington, D. C., in the interest of Oregon lands, and especially for the purpose of securing for lieu land purchasers the right to locate and secure land with scrip or otherwise, Governor Chamberlain said yesterday evening to the Salem Statesman:

"Although I had a very pleasant interview with Secretary Hitchcock and Commissioner Richards, both of whom were very courteous and seemed anxious to assist me in every way they could, I did not accomplish my purpose, and I am not at all satisfied with my success. I asked the officials to adopt some rule in the department whereby the purchasers of lieu land from the state would be given the preference right of selection under the general laws of the state and the United States, but they claimed they had no power to give the purchasers a preference right to the selection of land, without additional legislation empowering them to do so, and that therefore they had no other policy to pursue than that which they had been following, viz: First come first served, whether these men were California scrippers or bona fide settlers, and they could not adopt any rule under the law to act otherwise. I claimed that the department had the right to adopt a rule giving the purchasers the preference right, and I think so yet.

"As to Mr. Richards' suggestion as to the state's rights to make a formal relinquishment of the selection of lieu land, while the proof of the mineral base land is pending a decision in the department, for the purpose of protecting the purchaser, I contend that that is no relief whatever, and I pointed out to those gentlemen that I had no right, at least no desire, to assume that my predecessor in office made a mistake in furnishing his base; neither have I the right to assume what decision the department will arrive at in regard to whether the base is valid or not, and I certainly would not assume to anticipate the opinion of the supreme court upon a case appealed from the circuit court. Therefore I shall not relinquish upon any piece of land until the department shall have passed upon it finally.

"There are thousands of acres of scrip held in this state by land speculators, who are ready to grab up every bit of valuable land that is released, and I do not propose, on that account, to relinquish upon any piece of land until I learn whether the secretary of the interior is going to hold against me. All of this scrip is perfectly useless because there is nothing upon which it can be located, and this is because there is much valuable timber land held by the government in the forest reserves."
