The bride is a well educated young woman and wished to be married according to the laws of the American, hence she brought her spouse to the clerk for the necessary permit and ceremony.

IN SUPREME COURT

HEIRSHIP CASE FROM THE RESERVATION.

Question of Property Rights of Legal Inheritors and Natural Descendants—Suit on a Policy in the Woodmen of the World, the Order Having Taken an Appeal.

The attention of the supreme court was occupied this morning by the case of Agnes Kalyton, by Louise Kalyton, her guardian ad litem, appellant, vs. Mary Kalyton et al. respondents. It is an appeal from the court of Judge W. R. Ellis, and Henry J. Bean appears for the appellant, while the respondent is represented by T. G. Halley.

The suit is an action in equity brought by the plaintiff to establish her right to a quarter section of land on the Umatilla reservation and allotted to Joe Kalyton, deceased. The plaintiff claims the land as the child and heir to the deceased, and the defendant sets up a like claim on the ground that she is the sister and heir of the deceased, who, she alleges, died intestate. The court below found that the child was illegitimate, and from this decision the plaintiff appeals.

The appeal of Sarah C. Miller, plaintiff and respondent, vs. The Head Camp, Pacific Jurisdiction, Woodmen of the World, defendant and appellant, was argued this afternoon before the court. It is an appeal from the circuit court of Jarney county, M. D. Clifford, judge, and was argued for the appellant by A. D. Stillman, and for the respondent by Biggs & Biggs.

The case is a suit brought to recover on a policy taken in the Woodmen of the World by F. T. Miller, deceased, made payable in favor of his mother, the plaintiff. The order claims that the plaintiff was not in good standing at the time of his death, and therefore refused to pay. The lower court decided in favor of the plaintiff, and from this decision the defendants appeal.

CANDIDATE FOR FIRE CHIEF.

W. R. Withee an Thomas Nelson, and Perhaps Others Will Be.

At a meeting of the Alert Hose team last evening, W. R. Withee was placed in nomination for reelection as fire chief for the coming year. At a meeting of the hook and ladder company several nights ago, Tom Nelson was put in nomination for the same place. Each team in the city has the right to put a man in nomination for the office of chief, the matter to be decided at the city election, held the first Monday in December. It is expected that the other companies in the city may have candidates for the office, as each wishes to have a man from its own ranks at the head of the department.

UNDER SUSPICION.

AS TO THE POLL TAX

PROBLEM IS NOT AN EASY ONE TO HANDLE.

Not Certain That a Man Who Will Not Pay It Can Be Made to—Only Two Hundred and Nine Poll Taxes Have Been Paid in This Year.

The poll tax question is a bad one in the estimation of Marshal Sheer. It has given him no end of trouble in the past, and now it is up again, and is causing him uneasiness. It seems to be a bad law in the application of it, and one hard to handle. If a man wants to pay the tax he will do so, and if he does not there is no easy way to compel him to do so.

It is provided in the law that if a man will not pay, his property can be attached and sold, but this is a hard thing to do and one that the officers are loath to execute. The city will lay itself liable if it proceeds unwisely, and under those conditions the marshal does not like to force the issue. However, it is his intention to get all that he can from those in the city who will pay, and if the government wishes him to force the matter, he will do so.

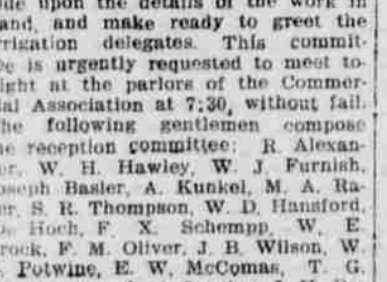

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

Large Attendance and Great Interest Taken in the County Meeting Now in Session.

The Umatilla county teachers' institute at Weston was well attended on the first day, there being 132 registered yesterday evening.

Dr. Sheldon, of the department of pedagogy, of the State University at Eugene, delivered a forcible and instructive lecture on "Nature Study," followed by President R. C. French, of the Weston State Normal.

The official program, published in the East Oregonian some time ago, is being carried out in full. The meetings are held in Chapel Hall, of the Weston Normal, and the people of Weston are entertaining the teachers in a royal manner.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell delivered a lecture last night on "Horace Mann," which was well attended. Judge Lowell is a student of educational methods and his lecture was a gem from a literary and educational standpoint.

Superintendent J. F. Nowlin and his committees on arrangements have made the institute a great success, and it is one of the most profitable, if not the very best meeting of teachers, ever held in Umatilla county.

Expressions of appreciation for the hospitality of the people of Weston are heard on every hand, and the teachers and visitors are enjoying the visit to the fullest extent.

At the institute this afternoon, there were over 200 in attendance. State Superintendent Ackerman, who was to have addressed the teachers tonight, failed to reach Weston owing to poor train connections, and instead of the lecture which he was to have delivered, there will be a musical program, at Chapel hall, in which Miss Ethel Garfield and other well known Umatilla county musicians will take part. The regular program is being carried out today. The Pendleton club women are in attendance on the institute, and are taking an active interest in the work of the meeting.
