HEIRSHIP CASE FROM

THE RESERVATION.

Question of Property Rights of Legal Inheritors and Natural Descendants -Suit on a Policy in the Woodmen Taken an Appeal.

The attention of the supreme court was occupied this morning by the case of Agnes Kaiyton, by Louise Ka-lyton, her guardian ad litem, appellant, vs. Mary Kalyton et al. respondents. It is an appeal from the cours of Judge W. R. Ellis, and Henry J Bean appears for the appellant, while respondent is represented by T.

The suit is an action in equity brought by the plaintiff to establish her right to a quarter section of land on the Umatilla reservation and allotted to Joe Kalyton, deceased. The plaintiff claims the land as the child and heir to the deceased, and the defendant sets up a like claim on the ground that she is the sister and heir of the deceased, who, so she alleges died intestate. The court below found that the child was illegitimate, and from this decision the plaintiff ap-
