COUNTY COURT.

Contest Over Issuance of Liquor License—Various Resignations.
The county court this morning received the resignation of C. A. Smith, as supervisor of the Pilot Rock road district, and appointed Francis M. Smith in his place.
The resignation of J. P. McManus as justice of the peace for Pilot Rock was accepted, and Abraham Miller was appointed to take the office.
B. F. Dennis, the justice of the peace of Ukiah, also tendered his resignation and it was accepted, but as yet no one has been appointed to fill the vacancy.
There is quite a fight on in the county court over the granting of a liquor license to J. F. Taylor, of Alba. Taylor filed a petition for a license and Charles E. Hoover has filed a protest, alleging that all of the names on the petition were not bona fide residents of the district. The case is now being heard, and a number of witnesses have been examined. The court has expressed no opinion in the matter as yet.
The court this morning appointed H. L. Frazier, of Milton, and G. W. Hunt, of Echo, as the delegates for the irrigation convention.
The rest of the work of the court, has been in auditing bills for the past month's expenses.
