CORPORATION TAX LAW

State Treasurer Moore Says to Leave it Unchanged.

State Treasurer Moore, in speaking of the corporation tax law, and of the prospect of the special session changing it, said yesterday:

"The corporation tax law should be left unchanged. The corporation tax is not working a hardship upon legitimate corporation, and it is bringing a large revenue to the state. The only concerns that demand a change in the law are the 'wildcat' companies that cannot afford the in corporation fees. Any company form ed upon a legitimate basis with a cap-ital of \$1,000.000, or any other sum, can afford to pay the fee. If a com-pany is formed upon any other than a good business basis, the state is better off without it."

The new schedule will go into effect about the middle of the month, but until that time the exact times of the trains will not be known.

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




