CORPORATION TAX LAW.

State Treasurer Moore Says to Leave it Unchanged.

State Treasurer Moore, in speaking of the corporation tax law, and of the prospect of the special session changing it, said yesterday:

"The corporation tax law should be left unchanged. The corporation tax is not working a hardship upon any legitimate corporation, and it is bringing a large revenue to the state. The only concerns that demand a change in the law are the 'wildcat' companies that cannot afford the incorporation fees. Any company formed upon a legitimate basis with a capital of \$1,000,000, or any other sum, can afford to pay the fee. If a company is formed upon any other than a good business basis, the state is better off without it."

NEW O. R. & N. TIME

WILL GO INTO EFFECT
MIDDLE OF THE MONTH.

Will Shorten the Running Time and Bring Some Trains Into Pendleton at More Convenient Hours—Eating Stations Cut Out and Diners Added.

The passenger schedule of the O. R. & N. is to be revised over the entire system during this month, in order to reduce the running time from the East to the coast. Superintendent O'Brien yesterday stated that the time of the trains running out of Portland and through Pendleton would perhaps change in about the following manner:

No. 2, east-bound, which now leaves Portland at 9:20 a. m. would be changed to 8:45, which would put it through this city nearly at 4:45 p. m.

No. 6, which leaves Portland for the east at 8:15 p. m. would be sent out at 7:45, which would cause it to arrive in Pendleton at 3:45 a. m.

No. 1, would reach here at 10 o'clock a. m., according to the new schedule, and No. 5 at 12:45 a. m.

These changes are made partly to insure connections with the Northern branch at Umatilla, and to make time faster to the East.

Dining cars have been put on all of the through trains and the eating stations have been cut out so that the trains will not have to stop for meals, and every other item in the running that will shorten the time, will be taken advantage of.

The new schedule will go into effect about the middle of the month, but until that time the exact times of the trains will not be known.

DEATH OF A VETERAN.

John W. Kimberlin Passes Away.
Aged 62 Years.

John W. Kimberlin died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. H. Bryant, this morning at 5 o'clock, after a long illness of dropsy and other complications.

The deceased was born in Marion county, Indiana, in 1841, and was a veteran of the civil war, having enlisted in the 122d Volunteer Iowa Cavalry at the first of the war, and serving with that body of troops during the entire war. He has been a resident of this city for the last nine years, and is well known here among the old soldiers and the elder residents.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. J. H. Bryant, of this city, and Mrs. Jessie Cathman and Mrs. O. C. Smith, of Umatilla.

The funeral services will be held from the residence at 621 Willow street, tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, under the auspices of the G. A. R. The sermon will be preached by Rev. G. W. Rigby and the interment will be made in Olney cemetery.

All old soldiers are respectfully requested to be at the residence promptly at 2 o'clock.

WILL FORCE ATTENDANCE.

Principal of La Grande Schools Will See if the Truant School Law is Valid.

La Grande, Nov. 6.—Professor Hockenberry, superintendent of the city schools is making an effort to eradicate truancy from the public schools and will enforce the state law compelling parents to send their children to school.
