NEXT CONSISTORY

MUCH INTEREST TAKEN IN IT IN WASHINGTON.

Likelihood of Elevation of Archbishop Ryan to be a Cardinal—He Will be the Third American Cardinal, the Others Being McCloskey and Gibbons.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—In Roman Catholic circles much interest is felt in the public consistory in Rome today, the first since the elevation of Pius X to the chair of St. Peter. It has been reported that announcement will be made at the consistory of the appointment of Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia as a Cardinal, but in well informed circles here the truth of this rumor is doubted. It is regarded as more likely that only two Cardinals will be named—Monsignor Merry del Val, as the inevitable result of his appointment as Papal secretary of state, and Monsignor Callegaria, Archbishop of Padua, owing to the old friendship and affection between him and the Pope.

Ryan's Elevation a Matter of Time.

At the same time there is reason to believe that the elevation of Archbishop Ryan will not be long delayed. It is said that soon after his election Pope Pius had an extended audience with Cardinal Gibbons, in the course of which he asked the Cardinal if he would not advise the appointment of another Cardinal in the United States. Cardinal Gibbons immediately brought to the Pope's attention the name of Archbishop Ryan and the pope then decided, it is said, to raise the Archbishop to the Sacred College.

If, as has been reported, Archbishop Ryan is now a Cardinal in petto his appointment would necessarily be publicly announced at the consistory today. If such is not the case, however, it may be taken for granted that his elevation will be delayed another year and possibly longer. Little doubt is expressed that the honor will be his sooner or later. He will be the third American Cardinal, the others being Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore and the late Cardinal McCloskey of New York.

limitation of time in which an appropriation shall be applied to beneficial use.

The record in some of our counties would, doubtless, disclose claims made under the act of 1891, the aggregate of which would cover the water in the stream filed upon in double the amount of its highest flow, and scarcely an appreciable moiety of the whole number have ever been developed beyond the posting of the notice of appropriation.

Is it any wonder, under such conditions that the officers of the Government Reclamation Service hesitate to enter the Oregon field?

6. Lastly, it is imperative that the state shall reserve all rights unto itself and shall withhold all waters not now appropriated, for use by the general government for reclamation purposes for a period of five years, provided, however, that the secretary of the interior shall cause immediate examination of the arid region streams within the state and shall announce prompt acceptance or rejection of them for reclamation work.

State Irrigation Engineer.

7. The creation of the office of a State Irrigation Engineer, the duties of which shall be to secure complete hydrographic surveys of each river and water source in Oregon, and secure a place to record all essential facts relating to water rights upon each. Which officer shall be clothed with authority to establish irrigation districts throughout the arid section of the state and to enforce just and equitable rules and regulations touching the appropriation and use of water, and to have general authority to carry out the provisions of law relating to water rights and irrigation in the state, and generally to enforce especially all the provisions above set forth.

The subject is of far-reaching importance to our state, and no act of legislation in recent years has been of so great moment to the future as the embodiment into law of the best thought upon this question.

California, Colorado, Wyoming, Nevada, Utah and Idaho have taken advanced ground in recognition of the needs of the hour, and their recent legislation upon water rights and irrigation attest the courage and foresight of their citizens and adorn the statutes of our time.

Will not Oregon, incited by the knowledge that the federal government is helpless here until wise laws are enacted, mindful of the wealth and population always the concomitant of irrigation development, join their ranks, and help to make arid America ultimately the garden of the world?
