### GENERAL NEWS.

The mercury registered 10 degrees below zero at Gunnison, Col., Wednesday last.

One and a half million cars are in use on the railroads of the United States. Ten per cent are smashed or worn out every year, making an annual output of 150,000 new cars necessary.

The Mexican Central railroad which is a Rockefeller property, is being extended south from the City of Mexico to the Guatemalan frontier, to connect with the northern end of the Guatemalan Central.

Fire destroyed a mail car and all its contents on the road between St. Petersburg and Moscow. Russian authorities claim that the loss of money and other valuables amounted to \$3,500,000. Spontaneous combustion.

Judge Anton, of Sunbury, Pa., has decided that decisions of the anthracite strike commission are not binding upon either party. The particular decision upon which the issue was made was in favor of the miners.

The well known ocean carrier, the South Portland, is in the ratlines at San Francisco, her management being accused of filibustering. The specific charge is of taking munitions of war from Brooklyn to the Venezuelan rebels.

Charlie Davis, a logger at Cottage Grove, Or., was drowned Thursday.

The steamer Innaha, which was wrecked on Snake river, near Mountain Sheep rapids, this week, cost her owners \$35,000.

Goldie Hart, a denizen of the tenderloin district of Portland, shot and killed herself Thursday morning in a fit of remorse.

J. E. Clayborne, colored, shot and killed Cora Curtiss, a colored girl, at Wallace, Idaho, Thursday, because she refused to marry him.

Mrs. J. Randall, was instantly killed by a falling tree, Thursday morning, while sitting in her home at Rainier, Or. A heavy gale was blowing and a large tree fell across the house.

Mayor Pat Mullins, of Butte, has sued the Inter-Mountain Miner for \$50,000 damages, for publishing damaging articles about him in connection with the recent shut-down in that city.

Homer Davenport, formerly of Silverton, who has been on a \$10,000 per year salary as cartoonist with the Hearst papers, has resigned his position and will go on the lecture platform.

Four deputy sheriffs, hunting through all the hiding places in Salt Lake City, have failed to discover Apostle Heber J. Grant, of the Mormon church, wanted for polygamy in that city.

William Schmitt, a 14-year-old boy of Eugene, was almost scalded to death Thursday by turning a tea kettle of boiling water over on himself. He was ill and fainted while standing by the kitchen stove. In falling he overturned the kettle.

Two masked men lined up 14 customers in the Exchange saloon, in South Portland, Thursday morning and robbed them of their change and took \$34 from the till. They overlooked \$2,500 which was in the unlocked safe. Their mistake was due to extreme nervousness.

### WILL FIND THE POLE.

## Alaskan Scientist Get the Genuine North Pole Fever.

Seattle, Nov. 13.—Andrew J. Stone, the naturalist who has attained considerable reputation through his work during the past nine years in Alaska and the Northwest territory, may lead an expedition to find the North Pole, going by way of Bering straits and the Northwest passage.

Mr. Stone believes that the actual hard experience of following the dog teams, "mushing" as it is called, over the frozen tundra of Alaska is the best possible preliminary experience for a polar explorer. There are prospectors in Alaska who know more of driving dog sledges and battling with the elements of the North than any of the old explorers could possibly have known, and numbers of those men could be secured for a polar trip.

"I am convinced," said Mr. Stone, "that with the knowledge gained in recent years in the north, of condensed food supply and of proper

ways of dressing and keeping protected from the elements, that with a rightly constructed ship the pole can be reached by following the western route selected fifty years ago by the Franklin expedition."

Should Mr. Stone's plans mature he will devote next year to preparation and will be ready to start north in the summer of 1905.
