Prettier environment than the beauty of Music Hall on last Monday night could not have been devised for the reception and ball tendered Governor Chamberlain and wife, ex-Governor Geer and wife and other visiting delegates to the irrigation convention, which was held here the fore part of the week. The hall was a bower of beauty, although most of the decorations were done in alfalfa, wild rye, sage brush and bunch grass—products of Umatilla county. At certain intervals around the hall were huge bunches of the different products arranged in artistic fashion against the walls. Between these decorations, bannet was draped. Indian robes were used in profusion in covering the benches, which lent a cheerful glow, along with the many Japanese lanterns suspended from the ceiling. The screen used in front of the musicians was unusually attractive as well as appropriate for the occasion. American flags were used as a background, a large mounted eagle forming the center piece. At the base of the platform sheaves of wheat were used for trimming. The center of the hall was exceedingly artistic with palm trees, about which were placed couches covered with Indian robes, and on the stands large bunches of yellow chrysanthemums. Here the receiving party stood.

Senator C. J. Smith was first in line, introducing Governor Chamberlain, followed by Mrs. T. G. Halley, who presented the guests to Mrs. Chamberlain. Then came Mrs. G. A. Hartman, introducing Mrs. T. T. Geer, followed by Mrs. C. B. Wade, Mrs. Walter Pierce, Judge and Mrs. Eilla. At the close of the reception hours the line was formed for the grand march, which was led by Governor Chamberlain and Mrs. T. G. Halley. From that time until a late hour, dancing was indulged in to the strains of Kirkman's orchestra.

At a table in one corner of the hall sherbet was served and in the lodge room adjoining, light refreshments were to be had at any time.

There was a large attendance, who desired to greet our chief executive and join in the evening's festivities. A jollier crowd never gathered in Music Hall.
