Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Bell, of Laramie, Wyo., are at the Hotel Pendleton, Mr. Bell is one of the prominent sheep-raisers of his state, and is here looking for 12,000 head of sheep to buy and ship to his ranges in Wyoming. He has been in consultation with Charles Cunningham and James Hackett and other sneepmen of this city, and while nothing definite has been done in the way of a sale, it is probable that he will be able to gachtogether the number wanted in a short time.

Sheep at this time are not so easy to buy as they were a couple of weeks ago, and for several reasons. Up to the first of this month many of the sheep owners in this part of me state were willing to sell a large number of their sheep; but that time is now passed, for they have made arrangements to winter their flocks, have bought feed, hired herders and established their camps for the win-ter. Having made all these arrange-ments they can not afford to sen at the same figure that they could a

short time ago.

Besides that, the breeding season is nearly half over. The rams were turned in with the ewes about the first of the month and will be kept there for about 30 days. Owing to the fact that many of the sheep raisers in the country have invested. this part of the country have invested in blooded rams and have bred tueir flocks to them, it is impossible to sell for the same price that held 15 or he days ago. The sheep situation is good at present, all of the flocks being in good condition and feed being plentiful, with good prospects for pastur-
