### GENERAL NEWS.

Evidence has been adduced indicating that the government has been swindled out of \$200,000 import duties by collusion of the Boston port board of appraisers with importers in that city.

Since the decision of the Pennsylvania courts that the state board of arbitration cannot enforce its decisions, more coal companies are repudiating the contracts required of them by the board.

William L. Elkins, the Philadelphia street car magnate, left an estate of \$30,000,000. Two hundred and forty thousand dollars is to be expended on buildings to shelter the destitute female orphans of Free Masons.

Frederick Ehrmann, vice-consul at Panama, is said to be a man of very unusual good judgment, tact and decision of character, shown by his conduct during the recent and present issues prevailing in his territory.

Mrs. Eliza Jane Thompson, of Hillsboro, Ohio, the inaugurator of the "crusades" against saloons in 1873, is still living, aged 88 years. It was a strictly religious movement. Many members of the National W. C. T. U. paid a pilgrimage to Hillsboro last week from Cincinnati.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Iwaco is buying new filters for the city water system, in order to keep out the typhoid germs.

The county courthouse of Tillamook county was destroyed by fire Saturday evening; loss about \$3,000.

On account of increasing business in the postoffice at Eugene, another letter carrier will be added to the list, making three regular carriers for that city.

Robert Gardner is in jail at Oregon City, charged with assaulting an Indian woman in that city, Sunday. In a scuffle with the woman he gouged out her one remaining eye.

Owing to the fact that no steamer has visited Tillamook for the past three weeks, the merchandise stores fear a famine of supplies. They depend on the regular visit of the coast steamers for their supplies.

Mrs. Maud E. Baker, wife of a logger of Sumpter, has eloped with a gambler named Waeger, taking \$300 belonging to her husband, deserting two little children and giving a bogus check for \$500 on a Sumpter bank.

The prisoners in the Multnomah county jail, who have been on a strike against the rock pile for some days, reconsidered and returned to work Monday morning, after subsisting on a bread and water diet for four days.

In a bitter quarrel over a shipment of cattle at Bozeman, Mont., Monday morning, Henry Fleming shot his brother, Bowman Fleming, and then shot himself. Both are dead. They were prominent and wealthy cattlemen and had never quarreled before.

### CIRCUS AT WHITMAN COLLEGE.

Students Preparing for a Great Mid-Winter Event.

Walla Walla, Nov. 17.—A large force of carpenters and decorators are at work in arranging Armory hall for the mid-winter circus that will be given this week under the auspices of Whitman College and the Walla Walla Military band.

The interior of the hall has been transformed into a large circus tent. Canvas had been draped from the ceilings and walls to represent as nearly as possible a tented inclosure. The seats have been arranged around the room in regular circus style and the entire hall will have a very unique appearance.

The opening will be Wednesday evening and a performance will be given every night during the remainder of the week. A splendid program of athletic turns has been arranged for, including trapeze and bar work, tumbling, pyramid posing and wrestling matches.

### ANOTHER BAND OF BEEF.

J. D. Combs Starts to Baker City With a Band of 250 Head.

Canyon City, Nov. 17.—J. D. Combs took his departure yesterday for Baker City with a band of 250 head of beef cattle which he has just purchased from stockmen in the southern and western part of Grant county.

He has a contract for the delivery of this band of beef to Pendleton, but says that he was unable to get the necessary pasture or feed along the route, so he drives to Baker City and will ship from there to Pendleton. Handling beef at this season of the year is quite expensive as hay is very high in every section of the country.

Mr. Combs' band is composed principally of cows for which he paid \$22 per head. For two-year-old steers he paid from \$24 to \$26 per head and from \$30 to \$33 per head for three-year-olds.

Wind Demolished House. A small house occupied by Chas. Wells, near Froewater, was blown over during the severe windstorm Saturday, and completely demolished.

The family escaped through a window, after the house had moved from its foundation. They took refuge in a collar which was partly covered in by the house, as it turned over on its side. A hired man remained in the house, but was not seriously injured.

Teachers Object to Fines. Seventy Portland school teachers have been fined \$5 each, according to law, for failing to attend the county institute. M. L. Pratt refused to accept his check with the \$5 fine deducted, and a wholesale law suit to test the validity of the law is expected.

Commissioner Richards Coming. Commissioner of the General Land Office W. A. Richards, is now in San Francisco, en route north to make a personal inspection of the land situation in Oregon and to investigate the reported frauds on the ground.
